COUNTY INDEBTEDNESS.

If it was necessary, perhaps, the Register editor could figure out some way by which he could lift himself over a fence by his bootstraps. The manner in which he figures out the Lane county indebtedness at a little over a third of what the reports show it to be leads us to this assumption.

The statement of outstanding warrants, and interest thereon to March 31, 1900, shows the sum of \$114,695.98. There is no mistake about that. Then the Register gives resources of \$66,739.33, which it says are "applicable to the payment of county warrants." Therein the figures do not lie. They only show the sum of \$3,300 in the hands of the county treasurer applicable to payments on warrants. The big-ended balance is made up of "estimated unpaid taxes" and "value of tax sale certificates," both of which the Register says are "applicable to payment of county warrants."

Therein the Register editor states what is not true. Not one dollar of those unpaid taxes and certificates of sale are applicable to the payment of county indebtedness. If they were County Treasurer Patterson would advertise for warrants, pay them off, and stop interest charges.

Here is another joker in addition to the Register manner of deducting unpaid taxes as available resources: It will be eight months before the county can make another tax levy. During those eight months the expenses and indebtedness of the county will steadily accrue, while there will be no fresh resources with which to meet the obligations. The delinquent taxes must be collected by levy and sale, and in process of such collection probably three per cent of the same will be left on the hands of the county. Taking present delinquency figures as a basis from which to estimate the county would only realize about \$65,000 of the \$66,700 delinquency. Payments on the county debt from delinquency collections will not greatly exceed the total of the amounts of new indebtedness that will steadily accrue from month to month, therefore the statement of the present indebtedness of \$114,675 may be accepted as a reliable estimate of present obligations for which Lane county is held, and of which no considerable reduction can possibly be made during the current fiscal year.

Warrants for nearly \$3,000, drawn in April, are not included in the above indebtedness amount.

SOME M'KINLEY DIPLOMACY. In promptly demanding the payment of one hundred thousand dollars due from Turkey for missionary outrages in Turkish territory in years gone by, the state department may be illustrating the truth of the old adage "penny wise, pound foolish." It is said there are 3,500,000 Mohammedans in the Sulu island group of the Philippines, whose devotion to the caliph approaches fanaticism.

The most ordinary kind of diplomacy would be above needlessly offending a personage that has it in his power to cause us no little trouble, and that without taking chances of harm to himself. Turkey never pays her debts. The state department should not press these just demands for settlement when no good could possibly result therefrom. All this sudden activity seems out of place and uncalled for, else the administration is attempting to deceive our people by a mere show of authority which it does not propose to press to a conclusion. In other words the administration is "playing to the gallery. Trying to make votes.

Do not forget that before you can cast a vote at the coming state and presidential elections your name must be on the register. The time is now on to have your name put there. If not registered before May 15 you cannot vote. You can register before any notary public or justice of the peace free of cost, or at the courthouse in the county clerk's office. Do not neglect to register.

No Columbia Flood This Year

It seems to be the general opinion of old residents along the Columbia and Willamette rivers, and steamboat men, that the freshest this year will be light, says the Portland Telegram. They say this because there is not much snow left in the mountains to be melted by the warm weather in June, as is generally the case. The spring has been so forward that a great deal of the snow has already disappeared, especially from the foothills. When the weather does get hot it is thought that not enough water will come down the Columbia to flood the Cascade Locks, as it did last year.

Last season at this time the conditions were different. Progress of the freshest is at least one month ahead of the ordinary. The Upper Columbia is rising already, so much so that steamboats cannot ascend the Three-Mile rapids owing to the swift cross currents.

Immense Fish Cold Storage Plant

The cold storage plant of S. Schmidt & Co. at Astoria, is finished and ready for operation. The plant is an immense one, as the main building is 226 feet long by 80 feet wide, two stories high. The entire plant, as it stands, represents a cash value of \$72,000. The capacity of the plant is 40 tons of frozen fish and 10 tons of ice per day. This does not include the capacity for handling salted and pickled fish, and that is practically limited only by the amount of fish secured.

The output of this plant will be shipped direct to New York, where the head office of the company is located, and from there it is distributed throughout the world.

State Band Association.

Charles E. York, of Portland, and A. C. Shute, of Hillsboro, president and secretary respectively of the State Band Association, says the Salem Journal, have closed arrangements with the state fair officials to hold their annual meeting in Salem during fair week. They will bring 200 musicians and on Salem day all will consolidate in one grand musical combination. These musicians will give concerts at the fair, will have a daily parade and will also give a grand ball. They expect to arrange to occupy tents on the grounds, and are busy perfecting their arrangements.

One of the "Talks With Napoleon" quoted from Dr. O'Meara's diary in The Century records Napoleon's indignation at being, as he considered it, spied upon while living at St. Helena. "I understand," said he, "that an officer is placed here to report about me and to see me two or three times in the 24 hours and that they are talking of making him go into my chamber to see me if I did not come out. Any person," said he then, with considerable agitation, "who endeavors to force his way into my apartment will be a corpse the moment he enters it. If he ever eats bread or meat afterward, I am not Napoleon. This I am determined on."

"I know that I will be killed afterward, as what can one do against a camp? But what of that? I have faced death many a time. Besides I am convinced that this governor, this chief of jailers, has been sent out on purpose to poison me or put me to death some way or another or under some pretext by Lord Castlereagh. "I have seen," continued he, "Russians, Prussians, Arabs, Cossacks, Tartars, Spaniards, Persians, Turks" (here he enumerated a great many more), "and never in my life before did I behold so ill favored and forbidding a countenance or so down and horrid a look. He is a man, to judge from his physiognomy, that one would select for the commission of any atrocious crime and as such has been selected out by your ministers, I suppose, on purpose to make away with me."

The Height of Storms.

Professor F. H. Bigelow furnishes The American Journal of Science with some of the results of the International cloud work for the United States. The penetration of ordinary cyclones into the higher regions of the atmosphere is slight. They are only two or three miles deep. Hurricanes are five or six miles deep. The anticyclonic and cyclonic areas are hardly to be considered as centers of motion except in the very lowest strata, since currents of air blow directly over them from west to east, even in the cumulus region of the Rocky mountain districts. The ordinary circulation theory does not hold good. In each stratum from the surface to the cirrus level about as much air moves north as south, for there are enormous counter currents passing by each other at the same level and not over one another at different elevations. This puts a new aspect upon the entire problem of the general circulation.—Nature.
