PIPE ORGAN RECITAL.

Edgar E. Courson in Eugene Monday, April 30.

The carpenters who were making the necessary changes in the Methodist church for the accommodation of the pipe organ have finished their work. The organ men have yet to make satisfactory motor connections for blowing. When these connections have been made the organ will be turned over to the organ committee of the church for their acceptance. There seems to be little doubt that it will be accepted, and arrangements have been made at a very large expense to secure Professor Edgar E. Courson, of Portland, to give the opening recital on the new organ. It has been after much correspondence in regard to the dates that Professor Courson consented to come. A member of the committee stated that during the next 14 days Mr Courson had engagements that would keep him in Portland, and that it seemed for a time that the plan would have to be abandoned. Several other organists were suggested, but Mr Courson's name was identified with highest excellence in music, and it seemed more advisable to accommodate the date of the concert to Mr Courson than to secure some other organist who had plenty of vacant dates. The committee desires that the people of Eugene shall hear the organ for the first time under the skillful manipulation of an artist. The only date upon which Mr Courson could come seemed to be Monday, April 30, and the concert will be given on that date. Preliminary tests of the organ indicate that it is an instrument of great power and rare sweetness. Several loose windows have been detected by the heavy tones of the pedal organ which rattled them in no uncertain fashion. These windows will be made to fit in their frames before April 30. The organ contains about 500 pipes and presents a most artistic appearance, there being nothing loud or glaring about the coloring. The case is of antique oak finish and is tastefully carved and decorated. Special arrangements will be made for the comfortable seating of the audience. In spite of the great expense of the concert, only a nominal admission fee of 50 cents will be charged, and children under 12 years of age will be admitted for 25 cents. The complete program will be published later.

A Commercial Club

Eugene will evidently be the last of the valley towns to organize a commercial club, and it is to be hoped that it will not be too far behind. Albany, according to the papers of that city, is assured the establishment of such a club and it will prove a great benefit. Salem has the Illihee club, without which the business and professional men of that city would feel lost. Of the other towns of the state, Astoria, The Dalles, Pendleton, Baker City, LaGrande all have such organizations while Portland is full of them. Eugene is the only town of progressive proportions without this adjunct of rest and convenience.

MAYOR HARRIS.

He is Out Trying to Raise Tongue Funds

Salem, April 20.—Dr. T. W. Harris, of Eugene, chairman of the central committee of the First Congressional district, accompanied by Census Supervisor C. B. Winn, was in Salem today, soliciting subscriptions to the Congressional campaign fund. Owing to the fact that the Salem Statesman, edited by Tongue's campaign manager of two years ago, is fighting the republican candidate for county clerk, Dr. Harris did not receive much encouragement here. W. W. Hall served the county one term as clerk, and fulfilled his duties so well that he was renominated without opposition and with a tremendous storm of applause. It is said that if the matter had been left to a vote in the democratic convention, Hall's nomination would have been endorsed by that body. Nevertheless, the Statesman has been carrying on a bitter fight against Hall's election. Leading republicans here declare themselves plainly to the effect that unless Tongue's friends will support the republican ticket, they will neither contribute to the campaign fund nor vote for Tongue at the polls. Some made themselves understood on this point today when asked by Dr. Harris for assistance.
