It Is Impossible to Lower It Below
\$118,000 at This Date.

SOME PLAIN FACTS.

The Register devotes about five columns to the GUARD this morning, a small portion of the same being attempts to cover up the large indebtedness of Lane county.

The GUARD at no time has criticized the court for erecting the court house, nor the expense incurred, about \$74,000, but upon a couple of occasions have taken the liberty to say what it thought of Delos D. Near drawing \$3,275.81 for the plans of said building, even charging 5 per cent commission on the court house clock, sewer, hose stands in the yard, etc. We reiterate: It was outrageous and indefensible from any standpoint.

To prove conclusively that our position is correct on "resources" we will give the following reports:

Below we give a statement showing the indebtedness of Lane county as near as it can be ascertained:

Balance indebtedness of Lane County.....\$63,540 87

We have not taken the time to compute the interest due on outstanding warrants, hence that item is not included in the above statement of indebtedness.

The interest probably amounts to \$4,000.
