A PORTLAND MURDER.

The Body of William Brannan, of
Ellensburg, N. Y., Found in
River at Portland.

The Portland Telegram of April 28
says: William Brannan, of Ellensburg,
N. Y., has been murdered. The body
was found in the Willamette river
this morning.

The crime bears a resemblance to the
Ray Stork murder at Salem, as the
body was weighted with iron before
being consigned to the river, in order
to keep the crime a mystery. The
deceased has a son in Seattle, who is
anxious to await the arrival of his
father before embarking for the gold
beaches of Cape Nome.

The body of a well-dressed man was
found floating in the river about 11
o'clock this morning. Around his
neck a wire was twisted, and to it were
attached two iron brake shoes, taken
from box cars, and weighing about 50
pounds.

Some time ago the police department
was notified that Brannan was mis-
sing since April 9, and the officers were
asked to institute a search for him. A
long investigation failed to reveal
Brannan's whereabouts, and the mat-
ter was nearly forgotten when the
body was identified by the description
this afternoon Brannan was on his
way from the East to join his son in
Seattle, for the two were going to Cape
Nome seeking fortune. Whether
Brannan had any large sum of money
on his person or not at the time of his
murder is not known, but as he was
on a long expedition, he probably
carried a considerable amount.

Besides a bunch of keys there were
absolutely no effects in the clothing.
Neither coins, watch nor papers were
left by the murderer in the pockets
of his victim.

A New Hop Scheme.

E. J. Miller, a well-known hop man
of McMinnville, but now with the
Lane Hop Company, of Portland, was
in Sheridan, Yamhill county, recently
making contracts for the 1900 crop,
quoting prices at 8 and 9 cents. Most
of the contracts made by his company
are on a partnership basis. Advances
of \$15 per acre are made at this time
for cultivation, the grower being
guaranteed 7 cents a pound, the
estimated cost of production. All that
is received for the crop above that
figure is to be divided equally. Only
choice hop yards are taken on this basis,
the company having started in to
secure 1000 acres and the list is about
made up.

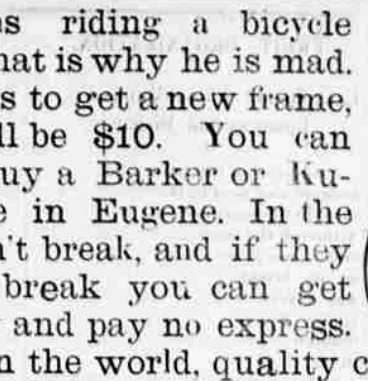
