FRUIT ORGANIZATION.

Lane County Union Winds Up Its
Business and Disbands.

A meeting of the Lane county fruit growers was held in the county court room in the court house this afternoon. Although the sun shone, the grass and foliage was green, and all nature had on its brightest colors, the meeting was a very blue one. No prunes, no apples, nothing to market, is little inducement to organize to sell something which doesn't exist.

The crop conditions are so unfavorable that it was decided no organization was needed this season. In order to be legally entitled to do business it would be necessary to have an incorporated organization, and this will not be effected, at least until next fall.

The only business transacted was to favorably consider a motion to disband and wind up the business of the Lane County Fruitgrowers' Union.

Passion Play at St. Leo's

Tacoma Leader: "Scene from the famous 'Passion Play' as presented once in every ten years in the little village of Oberammergau, Bavaria, were reproduced in St. Leo's church last night with the aid of Edison's wonderful moving pictures.

"The Savior's life, from the very moment the shepherds first saw the star of Bethlehem and heard the joyful tidings of the birth of Christ, until the sublime finale when the Redeemer slowly ascended to heaven, was shown by a series of photographic tableaux.

The scene of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the raising of Lazarus from the dead, the last supper, the trial and condemnation, the awful journey to Calvary, and finally, the crucifixion of the Messiah, were all given on the canvas. The expressions on the faces of the actors in the great drama could be distinctly seen, and everything in the pictures, the costumes, scenery, etc., were strictly accurate. The originator of the drama, from which these views were taken, had twice been himself an actor in the play as given by the Bavarian peasants, and after coming to this country spent \$125,000 in securing costumes and scenery and necessary paraphernalia for the production.

"The views were made more interesting by the lecture which was given at intervals during the play."

TORNADO IN TEXAS.

Town of Blum Partly Destroyed—
Several Persons Killed.

DALLAS, Tex., April 27.—A tornado passed through Johnson and Hill counties today, doing terrible destruction. The town of Blum was partially destroyed, and several persons fatally injured. A daughter of Dr. Banks had a scalding driven through her body, and is in a dying condition. The 8-year-old daughter of D. P. Hunt had both legs broken. Lacey Robertson's wife was caught in their fallen house, crushed and will probably die.

The public schoolhouse was wrecked and two pupils badly hurt. About a dozen dwelling houses were destroyed and the Baptist church wrecked.
