Daily Reville, New Whatcom, March 27: A large audience was in attendance at the opera house last evening to see the vitascope pictures. The entertainment opened with the ballet, "The Old Fields of Virginia," profusely illustrated with pictures. Saw Mill Fire Aftermath.

About 35,000 feet of lumber was destroyed by the fire instead of 100,000 as stated yesterday.

PIPE-ORGAN RECITAL.

The opening recital given at the M. E. church last night on the Kimball pipe organ, just placed in the building, was an event of much pleasure to all attendant. Mr. Ed ar E. Courson, the well known musician, of Portland, was selected to give the initial concert on the organ, and in this, his first appearance in Eugene, Mr. Courson has won many admirers for his playing, which will stand the closest criticism for its ease of execution and clear cut technique. That more vigor was not given some of the grandiose passages was due perhaps to the fact that the instrument did not have the requisite volume.

Mr. Courson played a series of numbers, beginning with the "War March of the Priests" from Athalia through such numbers as Tours "Allegretto Grandioso," the "Intermezzo," Handel's "Largo," Beethoven's "Pilaris Song of Hope," finishing with the "Hallelujah Chorus" of the Messiah. It was varied enough to please all listeners and served to show the tone of the pipes through their entire register, fortissimo, and pianissimo.

Mr. Glen, who sings the baritone in the May festival of music at Salem, sang his arlas and recitatives from St. Paul, putting into the interpretation of the music his strong and masterful temperament. His singing of "Consume them all," "O God, have Mercy," "I Praise Thee, O God," and in the duet, "Now we are ambassadors" was grand, and the people who are fortunate enough to hear the "St Paul" will remember the work of Mr. Glen in its connection with pleasure.

Mr. Kessler never sang in better voice than last night, was the general opinion of his audience. He possesses a voice that is full of melody and symphonic timbre and in the tenor solo of the "St Paul" gave an interpretation to Mendelssohn which was in every way worthy. His best singing was in "Cavatina—Be Thou Faithful," although in the recitatives, the duets and in "I will sing of thy great mercies" he did not fall in giving a pleasing interpretation.

Miss Denmore demonstrated, by her work as accompanist, that the full depth of her musical ability has scarcely been appreciated by Eugene music-lovers, who have recognized her pronounced talent in the work done as organist at the Congregational church and as accompanist for the Chancel Quartette. The new organ is sure of a capable interpreter with Miss Denmore at the key-board.
