The GUARD had the pleasure of informing the people as to the financial standing of the respective Citizens' and Republican candidates for county commissioner, J. R. Hill, Citizens, paying \$113 tax, and J. L. Taylor, Republican, 36 cents, and that a special tax, from which there was no exemption, of one cent a head on 36 sheep.

Now comes the Times logician and says the GUARD should support J. A. Bushnell, Prohibition nominee, because he pays \$335.22. It is a sorry argument, and not even of the mental calibre that would fit it for use of school children of the primary class. Mr. Hill's tax of \$113, and Mr. Bushnell's tax of \$335.22 is each a warranty that the man who pays the

same is a safe man to handle the finances to the county.

Handling county funds and affairs is not a sentiment. It is strictly a matter of business. The commissioner to be elected in June will assist in handling \$250,000 of county expenditures, or thereabouts, during his four years incumbency of the office. Will the voters reject a man who has made a fair financial success of his own affairs, and select one who presents the sorry spectacle of paying but 36 cents tax, and that a special tax, from which there is no exemption, of one cent a head on 36 head of sheep?

OREGONIAN MALIGNITY.

Abdul Hamid is the prince of Populists. He pays in promises to pay.—Oregonian.

And the United States government "pays in promises to pay." That is when its bonds become due they are refunded, and other bonds issued in their stead. And other European nations, besides poor Turkey, "pay in promises to pay"—Germany, France, Great Britain, and the lesser principalities and kingdoms.

The editor of the Oregonian well knows there is no other mode by which national debts can be paid than by "promises to pay." The New York World Almanac for 1900 gives the debts of the nations of the world at \$28,295,400,000, and all the gold and silver coin of the world at \$8,467,800,000. The entire stock of coined money would not pay one-third of the national indebtedness of the nations of the world.

And yet the Oregonian sneers at Populists as dealing in promises to pay! It is only another sample of Oregonian spite and malignity.

A Maryland congressman has introduced a bill for the repeal of the Chinese exclusion law. Instead of repealing the law it should be supplemented by one that will exclude the Japanese that are arriving by thousands and are a menace to the labor interests of the country, particularly the Pacific Coast.

There are some peculiar ways of making a living. For instance the man who travels about the country with a dog that will jump from the top of a thirty-foot ladder onto netting. In justice there should be some way to remunerate the dog instead of the man—plenty of good steaks, and cats to chase at will.

The house of representatives was almost unanimous in favor of the popular election of United States senators. The reform is right, it is popular; and, besides, there was no danger that the senate would adopt it.

Hon. R. M. Veatch has ever been a friend of the masses and is the champion of the people's rights. He is the man who should represent Lane, Douglas and Josephine counties in the Oregon state senate.

Skipworth, Geer and Harwood are not pledged to vote for any individual as U. S. Senator. How is it with their opponents.

FLORENCE NEWS.

Clipped From the West of May 4.

A large addition to the Mapleton hotel is now in process of construction, the frame being already up.

A B Gray who has resided on Knowles creek for the past fifteen years has sold his ranch to A. P. Knowles, the consideration being \$1000.

About 800,000 feet of lumber was carried out from the Siuslaw mills Monday and Tuesday for the San Francisco and San Pedro markets.

Rev I. G. Knotts leaves the first of next week for a trip to St. Louis as a delegate to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church. He intends to stop for a short visit at Spokane, Helena and St. Paul and expects to be absent about a month.

The steamer Roberts on her return from Yakima last Saturday, brought in the machinery for M. E. Sabert & Co's mill which was purchased some months ago. The machinery was loaded on a large scow, which was towed down by the Roberts. It will be placed in position for operation immediately.

The contractors for the jetty work are having considerable difficulty to keep the framework of the structure in place till the rock can be put in to hold the piling securely. The high tide Saturday night took out four bents at the end of the roadway and carried away two dump cars that were standing on the bank. Fortunately the pile driver which they had been using that day to drive piles at the outer end of the jetty, had been pulled back toward the bank when the men quit work in the evening. Had this not been done the pile driver would probably have been dumped into the river with the rest.
