PASSION PLAY TONIGHT.

Grand Production at The Parker
Tonight.

The First M E church was crowded
to the very doors, last night, and the
gallery was filled to its entire capacity,
with the best people of the Capital
City to view the presentation of the
famous moving pictures—The Passion
Play—and none were there but were
deeply moved by the scenes from the
life of Christ as shown by the moving
pictures.The entertainment opened with a
series of Southern views and Spanish
War pictures, including the destruc-
tion of Cervara's fleet at Santiago, and
the surrender of General Torres to
General Shafter, after which the
Passion Play was presented. This
consisted of a series of views, by
moving pictures, as presented at Ober-
ammergau, Bavaria. These scenes
were taken by the animatograph from
real life, at the last presentation of the
Passion Play, and are, therefore, exact
reproductions of every scene of that
famous presentation. The life of
Christ is traced from his birth down
through his ministry. His betrayal,
his trial, the procession to the cross,
the crucifixion, the burial and the
resurrection. These scenes are all very
fine, and an air of religious solemnity
surrounds them, so much so that ap-
plause would almost appear sacrilegious.
The scenes are accompanied by sacred
music on the pipe organ, which makes
them doubly impressive.At The Parker tonight and tomor-

FOR CHIANG KIANG.

Hon. H. B. Miller and Daughter,
Miss Laura Will Leave
Thursday.Hon. H. B. Miller, consul to Chiang
Kiang, China, arrived home from
Washington, City, D. C., yesterday
morning. He received his instructions
from the secretary of state while
in that city, and also was given by the
Chinese minister to our government
letters of introduction, written in the
Chinese language, to the high officials
in China and also to the Emperor, and
to the director of the Imperial Railway
at Shanghai, China. Consul Miller
highly appreciates his treatment while
in Washington. He has engaged an
interpreter, a young Chinese who
finished a course at Harvard University
recently, but who is now at
Shanghai.Mr. Miller and daughter, Miss
Laura, will leave for Chiang Kiang on
Thursday afternoon's train; will pass
Friday at their old home in Grant's
Pass; will leave San Francisco on the
U. S. transport Logan, for Manila.
On the return from Manila they will
be put ashore at Nagasaki, Japan.
From that city they will go to Shang-
hai, China, about 600 miles, where
they will start on their journey to
Chiang Kiang, about 1,500 miles. This
trip will be made by railroads and
steamboat. It will take them probably
six weeks to make the entire trip. If
Mr. Miller likes the country the rest
of his family will join him this fall.Mr. Miller is one of our brightest,
most active and energetic citizens, and
he will be beneficial in introducing our
products in that mighty empire. His
daughter, Miss Laura, is a graduate of
the University of Oregon, is possessed
of a literary mind, and her pen will
be used to good purpose while in a
foreign land. Society regrets their

Will Be Provided by the Govern-
ment Soon as Possible.The Lane County Volunteer Associa-
tion has made application to the
government for tombstones to be
placed over the graves of deceased
soldiers, and the following letter is

Eugene, Oregon.SIR: By direction of the Quarter-
master General, I have the honor to
inform you that your application for
headstones has been received and will
be given due consideration.Numerous applications for headstones
are made to this office and considerable
time is required to verify the
military service and accurately list the
names of the deceased, have the stones
cut and lettered under contract as
required by law, and freight them to
places where they are transferred to
the applicant. It is not practicable,
therefore, to fix any definite date when
the headstones will reach the points
of delivery, but they are supplied in
every proper case as soon as circum-
