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## A CRUEL FROST.

Republican Campaign Starts Off  
Rather Tamely.

## NOT OVER 150 PRESENT.

For the past two weeks it has been  
advertised freely that Hon C W Fulton,  
of Astoria, would open the republican  
campaign at the court house in this  
city last evening. During the day  
posters were scattered over the city  
and some of the leaders were out  
asking "Bob," "Jim," "Tom," etc., to  
be sure and be out. All the candidates  
for office had also been summoned  
from near and far to help swell the  
mighty crowd.At about 8:30, Dr Kuykendall, the  
Boss of the G O P in Lane county,  
arose and after stroking his beard and  
grinning, made quite a talk, among  
other things predicting victory in  
Lane county and the re-election of  
McKinley. This was lightly ap-  
plauded by the "large" audience  
present of not over 150 persons, con-  
sisting principally of office-holders,  
United States and county, and their  
deputies, county candidates, a sprink-  
ling of ladies, several boys (who were  
present to escape the curfew law), and  
probably 15 or 20 private citizens.Charles W. Fulton then arose and  
coldly proceeded to deliver the opening  
speech to the frost-like crowd  
assembled. He was strongly in favor  
of a gold standard (notwithstanding  
having delivered hundreds of speeches  
in favor of gold and silver), was in  
favor of taxing the poor people of  
Porto Rico 15 per cent, and was an  
expansionist. In fact, he was in favor  
of everything and anything done by  
the McKinley administration. He  
said it was a long toboggan slide from  
Lincoln to Bryan, but forgot to say it  
was a much larger one from the Fulton  
of 1890 and 1900; nor did he read any  
editorials from the Oregonian burning  
him up for his actions at the Astoria  
congressional convention two years  
ago in trying to defeat the gold  
standard.After about two hours of this kind  
of talk, the small crowd adjourned with-  
out cheer, and silently departed for  
their respective homes.Mr. Fulton, the man who used to  
draw large audiences when he talked  
honestly for gold and silver, left on the  
3 o'clock train, glad to get out of town  
before it froze harder.It is said the legislative candidates  
in Lane county will all support the  
McBride-Mitchell-Fulton senatorial  
combine, if elected.Come again, Charlie, after June 4,  
and see how large a majority the
