SKINNED THE JOSEPHINE COUNTY STATESMAN.

An orator with the euphonious name of Smith has been imported from Josephine county to represent Mr. Booth, Republican candidate for joint senator of this district, in the Lane county canvass. Mr. Veatch gave Smith the privilege of appearing for his opponent at Coburg yesterday.

It was the chance Veatch had been waiting for since the forty days he and Smith were fellow members in the Oregon legislature of 1895.

Mr. Veatch told the audience that Smith was unanimous in voting for every job and steal that came before that body. Veatch was there and knows the record. The audience evinced appreciation of the scientific manner in which Smith was skinned by repeated cheering. And from the manner Smith figured an observer would have thought the board on which his person rested was covered with

tacks, or something else equally distressing.

We are of the opinion Josephine county Smith will be missing the rest of the campaign, at least from the sound of Mr. Veatch's voice.

BRYAN ON UNION

Extract from speech at Boston April 15.
I believe in co-operation. Men must co-operate in a party if they would be effective. You cannot fight a battle without the organization that a party brings. I have always believed in parties, but I believe that a party should be the means, not the end, and that the individual should employ that party which offers the best promise of securing the best end, and I believe, too, that where parties are going in the same direction, although under different names, they ought to co-operate as far as possible.

What difference does it make if populists wish some things that silver republicans and democrats do not favor? What difference does it make if democrats want some things that populists and silver republicans do not favor? What difference does it make if populists favor some things that are not wholly acceptable to populists and silver republicans? I say what difference does it make? We agree on the questions directly before us.

BABY BEEF.

A stock journal remarks that twenty-five years ago the prize beef animal was a 10 to 12 year old ox which had served his day and generation as a beast of burden, doing farm work, and then was fed for a year until he made a carcass of 1800 or 1900 pounds. It will be remembered when it was believed that the best beef was that grown on to the framework of such an aged beast and when what is now called beef was of no account.

Times have changed. A steer seldom now lives more than three years, most of them less. The old ox beef is a thing of the past and the public taste is demanding young beef, even baby beef, which finds a market at a year old. The calf of the beef breeds which is kept fat from the day it is born and turns the scales at 1000 or 1100 pounds at fifteen months will bring the top of the market and the most profit to its owner.

An old granger over at Coburg, yesterday, remarked that Lawrence Harris must have a wrong impression as to the office for which he is running. His speech was made up of stock campaign literature statements about expansion, the Philippines, and other national issues. The speech would have answered for Chicago or Podunk equally with Coburg. County and state affairs were ignored. The old granger suggested that "Mr. Harris must think he is up for congress or United States senator."

If E. R. Skipworth is permitted to finish the county canvass there will be no possibility of his defeat at the polls Monday, June 4. His speech at Coburg yesterday was a powerful presentation of facts that could not but impress his auditors with the belief that their interests would be ably championed should he be elected to the legislature.
