EARLY TAX ROLL CLOSING.

The county court has not followed precedent in ordering the sheriff to close the Lane county tax rolls and return the same delinquent May 25.

A very considerable amount of the taxes for the current tax year remain unpaid and the order of delinquency, which means the addition of costs for collection, will fall heavily on many taxpayers. While the taxes are due the custom of other years has been to allow the roll to remain in the sheriff's hands till a later date before compelling collection by levy and sale thereby entailing costs on the already overburdened taxpayer.

Last year the sheriff was not forced to return his rolls to the county court until July 4.

WORLD'S NATIONAL DEBTS.

The debts of the civilized nations of the world now add up over \$32,000,000,000. The New York World says to ascertain what thirty-two billions mean one has only to consider that the highest total value of the entire cotton crop of the United States in any recent year was less than \$300,000,000. If, therefore, the whole American cotton crop were sold for one hundred years in succession, and the proceeds applied to the payment of the world's indebtedness—mainly incurred for wars and war preparations—there would still remain an unpaid balance of nearly two billions.

In addition to the burden of such a debt, there is the annual interest which the many have to pass over to the few in the form of products before they can think of having anything for their own mouths and backs. All national debts are paid from the earnings of labor, but the blessings of war, for which we are told national debts are largely incurred, do not fall to those who labor to any great extent.

CONVENTION CITY ROBBERY.

The usual complaint of intending visitors and state delegation managers is already heard regarding national convention, city hotel rates. Kansas City, where the Democrats will gather on the Fourth of July to renominate Bryan is already elevating hotel rates to an extortionate figure. Hotel men have combined and agreed on a charge of five dollars a day for beds, with four beds to a room. That means twenty dollars per day to the delegate who goes to Kansas City with the intention of following the old fashioned idea of occupying his room alone.

In cases like this, though, there is no way to escape being robbed. Delegates will insist on sleeping in beds instead of hotel chairs and public park settees even if the privilege is charged for out of all reason.

Eugene hotels are crowded with men in quest of land investments, principally timber lands which are in great demand. Then there is a sprinkling of homebuyers, with not a few arrivals on their way to the through his control of the livery business of Eugene.
