U. S. Supreme Court Decides in Favor of Beckham.

THAT KENTUCKY CASE.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The Supreme court today handed down a decision in the contested Kentucky governorship case.

The decision of the Kentucky supreme court declaring Beckham entitled to the seat was affirmed.

[A bitter fight was waged between partisans of Goebel, democrat, and Taylor, republican, finally culminating in the assassination of Goebel, who held possession of the statehouse and public records. After the assassination Goebel's lieutenant-governor, Beckham, took up the fight for the seat. The supreme court of Kentucky decided in his favor and this decision of the supreme court of the United States finally settles what at one time promised to cause no little bloodshed in the Kentucky capital. The foul murder of Goebel allayed the intense partisan feeling and brought all parties to their senses.]

Defeated Washington by Brilliant Work.

SCORE 62 TO 60.

The interstate field meet at Seattle Saturday brought a victory to the U. O. that is appreciated. It was fair and hard won. The score of 60 to 62 tells the story. Each event was contested for with a vim and the last one was needed to decide the story. Manager McArthur and Trainer Trine have reason to feel proud of the showing made by their men in the first interstate contest. It is rarely that such unqualified commendation has been given a man and his system of training as that accorded Trainer Trine. The U. O. track team has never been defeated when he handled it. No more need be said. The boys arrived here this morning and will keep up their work until June 4, the date of the state field meet. Smith, U. O. beat the state broad jump record of 30 feet 6 1/2 inches, by Kuykendall, U. O. Following are the events and the winners:

CLERK LEE.

He Proposes to Disfranchise Citizens.

HERE'S THE NAMES.

County Clerk Lee holds that all registrations that were not in his office on May 15, 1900, previous to 5 o'clock p m, shall be rejected, notwithstanding the clerks of every county in the state, except Lane, have held otherwise. Why should he reject 30 names registered on May 15 by registration officers throughout the county with exactly the same power as himself. And again, when one notary public handed in his work to Deputy Hamlin on May 16 (the registrations having been made before May 15 before 5 p m), and was protesting to said deputy against czar-like authority County Clerk Lee appeared on the scene and growly insulted said notary in the courthouse, owned and paid for by the taxpayers of Lane county.

The GUARD has no idea of the politics of those rejected by Lee, but justice and fairness demand that they forthwith be placed on the register.
