REPUBLICAN LEGISLATION.

The last Republican legislature repealed the act creating the state board of equalization and offered no remedy for equalizing the assessment of the state.

The Multnomah county delegation controlled the last legislature. What is the result? The assessment of Multnomah county for 1899, shows a reduction of \$11,210, 693 in values from 1898. Money on hand and assessed in 1898 amounted to \$1,063,175 while in 1899 it decreased to \$527,225.

Town lots fell from \$20,261,534 to \$14,122,008. Improvements from \$9,772,497 to \$6,557,192. On April 5th, 1899, a little more than one month later than this assessment, the statements of the four National Banks of Portland showed deposits amounting to over five millions, and it is safe to say that the seven private banks of that city had as much more, or a total of ten

millions, and yet only one-half million was assessed.

The state tax this year, because of the great reduction in Multnomah county, is higher than it has been for years, and the burden is thrown upon the country.

Think of it! A reduction of more than eleven million dollars in one year in Multnomah county, while during the same period the Oregonian and all the Republican papers in the state have been crying prosperity and increased values. As a matter of fact, real estate values were higher in 1899 than in 1898, and this great reduction is a robbery of the other counties of the state. The election of the Democratic-Peoples nominees will cure this defect. Will you vote to protect yourself or the tax-dodger?

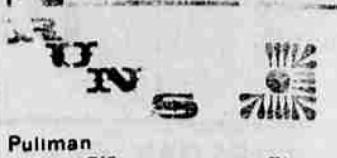
