TRYING TO DECEIVE THE PEOPLE.

The committee of the Citizens' party for County Judge of Lane County evidently did not stand in with the political out-throats and grafters known as the "push," when he was Secretary of State, or the people who live on the offices and pickings furnished by them would not be attacking him. Every accusation has been repeatedly answered, refuted and shown to be malicious falsehoods. They were inspired by persons who sought in that way to divert attention from their own crookedness and excuse their extreme littleness in causing his name to be withdrawn from the Senate as a regent of the University. One of these fellows, who is more noted for receiving bribes than for paying his debts is drawing the peoples' money while traveling over the state and ridiculing and lying about one-half of the taxpayers. With hatchet face, salmon complexion and horsebelly countenance he draws like a monkey show or a dog fight while Fulton and men of some character and ability have frosty receptions and slim audiences. The batch of lies to which this refers bears the earmarks of his facile pen. He originated and got them into the Oregonian probably without the knowledge of the proprietors and responsible editor, through a Californian who was sent to Salem to write up the Legislature and knew nothing about the subjects he handled but fell into the hands of the "push" and ferociously attacked nearly every person who had opposed it. He accused the Asylum and other State institutions with every crime in the calendar, and was a holy horror to the friends of the paper and the faction it represented and the delight of their enemies until he returned home to California. The rebash of these state misrepresentations sounds like his article signed "hop-picker" in the Oregonian several years ago attacking Governor Lord for taking unconstitutional salaries, but which he never dared to repeat after Lord replied in an interview that he had never taken more than the law allowed and had never taken \$700 as a member of the Legislature for voting for a United States Senator and then visited the East on money thus obtained. He is a daisy. He is so dishonest and treacherous that he is afraid he will rob himself, and perhaps believes that there are others like him. But there is only one such, and may there never be another. No better testimonial of good and efficient services as Secretary of State could be shown than the opposition of a gang who live by trafficking in offices and whose principal occupation and stock in trade is lying, deception, treachery, fraud and bribery. They say that the color of postage stamps have been changed since he was Secretary of State and he has used stamps not of the latest shade? Well, who ever before was little and mean enough to insinuate dishonesty and circulate a criminal libel on nothing but ignorance or malice or perhaps both? He bought stamps while Secretary of State and paid for them with his own money to put on campaign literature, which was afterwards sent out mostly by friends in large packages to be delivered by committees. He often received stamps of all denominations in place of money for fees, which he had either to keep or return and perhaps never get anything. He receives stamps now quite often for papers in sums of five cents to one dollar. He cannot know when they were issued—whether they are of the latest shade or are one, five or ten years old. They cannot be used to pay postage on papers at pound rates, as that must be paid in cash, and they cannot be sold or exchanged. If they cannot be used on letters, books, pamphlets and miscellaneous papers, what are they good for? Should they be thrown away to give somebody a chance to make a commission on selling stamps of the latest shade? If the person who spends his time in mousing over the color of stamps would attend strictly to his business it might be better for him and better for a service that is intended to be kept out of politics and serve the people. All the other lies were specifically and fully answered and refuted and shown to be malicious falsehoods when they were first inspired and published as an excuse for having withdrawn Governor Lord's appointments from the Senate. They were and are circulated for the sole purpose of misleading the people and diverting their attention while the gang are getting on their work on a conding public who are often the victims of such political schemers. The ex-Secretary of State did a vast amount of work for the State, such as had never been done by any of his predecessors and which he was not required to do, among which was the compiling and writing of a Political and Official History and Register of Oregon, covering a period of 75 years. As a recognition for compiling the history the Legislature passed a joint resolution giving him 500 copies of the book, which shows how these copies came "strangely" into his possession. Vituperation and vilification is poured out by wholesale for receiving pay for all commissions, when out of hundreds of pardons and restorations to citizenship he made every one free, and out of hundreds of complimentary commissions and military commissions not a dozen were ever asked to pay anything but were all made free. All the drive and rot about leaving the party and Tongue never having been for silver need no reply. They refute themselves. The ex-Secretary of State had honesty and courage enough to stay with his convictions and professions on the silver question, and in doing so sacrificed the best office in Oregon. Tongue and the party that supports him deserted and betrayed their convictions, if they ever had any, and their friends, to get the offices. Everybody with a grain of sense knows these statements to be true. The Oregonian has recently reprinted Tongue's free silver letter, which is one of the best ever published in Oregon on this subject. The ex-Secretary of State never deserted or betrayed his party or anything, living or dead, but the party and Tongue and all of his kind are the deserters and betrayers of their oft repeated professions and of these who befriended them. They have and will betray any party, any cause, any person or any community, to get into office and stay in.
