I, L. Bilyeu, and I, L. L. Stevens, each separately sworn each for himself, say: That on the 25th day of May, 1900, I called at the office of the Clerk of Lane county for the purpose of the official ballot used at the pending election. I had been previously informed, that said county clerk was distributing a name of H. R. Kincaid for the office of County Clerk. The name W. T. Patterson printed above the name of said County Clerk into the Recorder's room. I asked him as to the form of said ballots, and arrangement of names having the same initial. The Clerk's first reply was to the effect that he did not recollect how said names were arranged. I then went to the vault and brought therefrom and submitted one of the white official ballots, and I with him said ballot. I found that the name of the said County Judge first, and above the name of H. R. Kincaid, Citizens' candidate for said office, and that the name W. T. Patterson, Prohibition candidate for County Judge, was before and above the name of A. S. Patterson, candidate for said office, and that I objected to said arrangement of names and called said Clerk's attention to the requirements of the law touching the same, and said ballot could not be changed and corrected. "No it is too late, they are printed and distributed." Said clerk also stated to me that thought as long as the initials were the same, arrange them anyway, and stated that in arranging he naturally gave the preference to his own party.
