THOSE "PATTERSON"—"PAT-TISON" NAMES ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT.

The election law of the state of Oregon requires the county clerk of each county to arrange the surnames of candidates for the same office in alphabetical order, yst County Clerk Lee put the name of W T Pattison, Prohibition candidate for county treasurer, before that of A S Patterson, Citizens' nominee for the same office, although alphabetically considered the "e," fifth letter in Patt(erson)'s name, takes precedence over the "i," fifth letter in Patt(i)son's name.

Do you know why County Clerk Lee made such an arrangement? Simply in hope that some voter in reading down the ballot and marking his choice would place the cross that indicates his vote in front of W T Pattison's name, thinking

he was voting for A S Patterson, the Citizens' nominee. And, undoubtedly, "Abe" Patterson will lose not a few votes that were intended for him.

County Clerk Lee is responsible for this outrage. Men who love open, honorable dealing and impartial compliance with the law by sworn officials should remember this open disregard of the plain law and when they cast their ballots Monday make a cross before the name of Harry M. Milliron, Citizen's candidate for county clerk.

And be careful to make your cross mark before the name of A. S. Patterson if he is your choice for county treasurer. Do not be misled by similarity of names.

WHICH IS UNTRUTHFUL—MR. TAYLOR, OR THE REGISTER?

The Register of Friday morning is responsible for an ugly insinuation against the Republican candidate for county commissioner. In a list of candidates showing "what an X will do at the June election" it has this notice of the Republican candidate:

"46 X J. L. Taylor. He is not as rich as some men but he owns a homestead which together with improvements is worth several thousand dollars. We could not elect a better man for county commissioner."

The Register does not state the value of improvements, but they ought to form a considerable part of the "several thousand dollars." As homestead improvements are assessable the same as other property, and Mr Taylor's assessment only shows taxable property to the extent of 36 sheep, on which there is a special tax of 36 cents, an explanation is needed.

That explanation most probably would not show that Mr Taylor has made any false return to the assessor. It would only show that the Register has indulged in pleasant, but harmless exaggeration in its hopeless task of bolstering Mr Taylor up so the taxpayer can swallow his candidacy, "36 sheep" and all.

## IMPORTANT

Voters Should Read the Election Laws.

### SEVERE PENALTIES.

In order that the people may know just what are the penalties for attempting to bribe or unduly influence voters in an election in this state, the following provisions of the statutes are here printed. Their reading will be of interest to all, regardless of party and personal interest in the campaign. The sections of the law referring to this subject are as follows:

Section 1843—If any person shall give, offer, or promise to give any gift, gratuity, valuable consideration, or thing whatever to any voter of this state, or shall promise to do or cause to be done any act beneficial to such voter, with intent to influence or induce such voter to vote at any legally authorized election in this state for or against a particular person or candidate, or in a particular way, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one year nor more than five years, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year.

Section 1844—If any voter of this state shall accept any gift, gratuity, valuable consideration, or thing, or any promise thereof, or any promise to do, or cause to be done, any act beneficial to such voter, with the understanding or agreement, express or implied, that such a voter will, at any legally authorized election in this state, give his vote for or against any particular person or candidate, or in a particular way, such voter, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one year nor more than five years, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year.

Section 1846—If any person shall vote, or offer to vote, at any legally authorized election in this state, knowing himself not entitled by law to vote thereat, or shall vote, or offer to vote, at any poll or in any precinct at any such election, knowing himself not entitled to vote at such poll or in such precinct, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year, or by fine not less than \$100 nor more than \$500.

Section 1848—Any person who shall by promise of favor, or reward, or otherwise, induce or persuade any

person to come into this state, or into any county or precinct within this state, for the purpose and with the intent that such person shall, by so changing his habitation, vote at any general election which may hereafter be held in this state, at any place where such voter or person, is not a bona fide resident, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

Section 1849—Any person shall also be deemed guilty of a felony who shall by promise of favor, or reward, or otherwise, induce or persuade any voter within this state to absent himself from his actual and bona fide place of residence with intent to prevent or hinder such person from voting at such place of residence at any general election in this state.

Section 1850—Any person who shall, in the manner provided in the preceding section, induce or persuade any legal voter to remain away from the polls, and not vote at any general election in this state, on conviction, be deemed guilty of a felony.

Section 1851—Any person, upon conviction for a violation of either of the preceding sections shall be imprisoned in the penitentiary not less than one nor more than three years, or shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or shall be punished by both such fine and imprisonment. In the discretion of the court, shall be forever ineligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state.

Section 1910—It shall be unlawful in this state for any person to barter, sell, give away or in any manner dispose of any intoxicating liquor on the day of any general or special election of state, county or municipal officers, within the state, district, county or corporation in which such election is held.
