Stevens, being each separately sworn each for himself, says: That on the 25th day of May, 1900, I called at the office of the County Clerk of Lane county for the purpose of interviewing E. U. Lee, County Clerk, on the form of the official ballots to be used at the pending election. I had been previously informed, that said county clerk was distributing said official ballot with the name of O. F. Knox printed above the name of H. R. Kincaid for the office of County Judge, and the name W. T. Pattison printed above the name of A. S. Patterson for the office of County Treasurer. We called said County Clerk into the Recorder's room and there asked him as to the form of said ballots, concerning the arrangement of names having the same initial letter. Said Clerk's first reply was to the effect that he did not know or recollect how said names were arranged. I then asked to see the ballot as he had prepared and printed. Said Clerk then went to the vault and brought therefrom and submitted to me one of the white official ballots, and I with him examined said ballot. I found that the name of the said O. F. Knox was printed on said ballot as the Republican candidate for County Judge first, and above the name of H. R. Kincaid, Citizens' candidate for said office, and that the name of W. T. Pattison, Prohibition candidate for County Treasurer, was before and above the name of A. S. Patterson, Citizens' candidate for said office, and that I objected to said arrangement of names and called said Clerk's attention to the requirements of the law touching the same, and asked him if said ballot could not be changed and corrected. He said, "No it is too late, they are printed and partly distributed." Said clerk also stated to me, that he thought as long as the initials were the same, he could arrange them anyway, and stated that in arranging the names, he naturally gave the preference to his own party.

LOOK ON THIS, AND THEN ON THAT!

As stated in yesterday's GUARD, sample ballots of the Lane county official ticket were printed correctly after the GUARD's exposure of County Clerk Lee's wrongful arrangement of the names of the candidates for county treasurer and county judge, and placed in circulation with the forlorn hope of neutralizing the effect of the damaging statement of facts.

The exposure seems to have driven County Clerk Lee to desperation. This morning's Register had a "Sample ballot for Lane County, Oregon," printed on green poster paper, folded therein, on the bottom of which this note was printed, without signature or any memorandum to show by whose authority it was appended:

"NOTE.—The Eugene GUARD with its splendid facility for uttering falsehoods for campaign purposes says County Clerk Lee has placed the name of O. F. Knox for county judge, ahead of H. R. Kincaid's name on the ballot, and also says W. T. Pattison's name for treasurer appears ahead of A. S. Patterson's name. This ballot is an exact copy of every ballot sent out to all the precincts, and shows how the GUARD falsifies the facts with the hope of fooling the voters."

This sample ballot had the names of the candidates for county treasurer and county judge correctly printed thereon according to the law governing elections and the printing of ballots. We do not think it necessary to make any comments on the above mentioned affidavit, of Attorneys' Bilyeu and Stevens, and the unsupported "note" statement, printed above. We give the essential portions of the "affidavit" and "note" in parallel columns, and leave the question of veracity raised between the GUARD and the Register-Lee combination to the fair, impartial judgment of the citizen and voter:

AFFIDAVIT:

"This ballot is an exact copy of every ballot sent out to all the precincts."

If the ballots to be used Monday are found to be correctly printed it will only be because the GUARD exposure caused the destruction of 20,000, or more ballots, and the printing of new ones in conformity with the election law. County Clerk Lee is responsible for this bold attempt to deceive the voters whom he asks to re elect him county clerk.

DIVINITY SCHOOL

Baccalaureate Sermon at Christian Church Tomorrow.

GRADUATING EXERCISES MONDAY.

The Eugene Divinity school is closing the fifth year of its work, and will graduate its first class next week. From the first there has been a gradual increase in attendance, in interest and in the endowment fund to the school, while the association is entirely free from debt. At the present time the school has property of the probable value of \$8,000, which it will gradually increase according to the demands made upon it.

E. C. Sanderson, dean of the school, is really its originator and has labored indefatigably for its success. The school has a complete course of bible study, and is a distinct and separate institution. Its students, however, avail themselves of many of the branches taught at the University of Oregon, needed in their line of work. A correspondence course is also carried on, and through it many are studying the bible systematically. The faculty at present includes E. C. Sanderson, dean, Morton L. Rose, lecturer in pastoral theology and practical methods of church work. David C. Kellems, principal of the school of oratory and assistant in homiletics. John Handaker, instructor in missionary history and biography. Harry Benton, instructor in the correspondence bible course.

The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered at the Christian church tomorrow morning at 11 a. m., by Dean Sanderson, after which will follow the ordination of the following young men to the ministry: W. T. Matlock, E. F. Beaudreau, John J. Handsaker, E. M. Patterson, Harry Benton, F. E. Billington.

Monday night at the Christian church the graduating exercises will be held, and degrees conferred. President P. L. Campbell, of the Monmouth normal school, will deliver the address before the graduating class. Degrees will be conferred as follows: Bachelor of Divinity, G. S. O. Humbert; English Bible Course, L. D. Green, Mrs Clara G. Esson, Miss Margaret Daisley, Miss Mary Daisley, Harry Benton.

Dean E. C. Sanderson, whose work is always in the nature of a benefit to the institution of which he is the head, will leave June 8, on a trip to the Holy lands. En route he will attend the meeting of the world's Endeavor Convention at London, will make a short stay in France, and then go to Palestine and through Egypt, spending about three months in study which will prove of much value in his work.
