LINN COUNTY DEMOCRATIC.

Daily Has 450 Majority—Entire County Ticket Elected.

Special to the Guard. ALBANY, Or, June 5.—Daily's majority is estimated at 450. Entire union legislative ticket is elected. Complete returns from all but six precincts show Tongue behind his ticket in Linn county by 214 votes. The missing precincts are estimated. Vote will be close on supreme judge. Jeffrey's, democrat, for prosecuting attorney, will be about 350 votes ahead. Entire union county ticket is elected by from 100 to 600 majority.

RECALLS OREGON MURDER.

Capital Story of W. W. Saunders' Rise to Affluence.

W. W. Saunders, formerly of Corvallis, who shot and killed Charles Campbell at Albany about fifteen years ago, is now a prosperous lawyer at Spokane. His crime, arrest, escape to Alsea Bay coast, recapture, death sentence, new trial and pardon, together with the romance of his marriage to the young woman whose cause he championed, are well known throughout the Willamette valley, and are recalled by a recent dispatch to the New York Sun from Spokane. Despite its manifest inaccuracies, it will no doubt interest thousands who remember the crime and its sequence. Here is the dispatch:

In Western cities, especially those which partake of the character of a mining camp, there are many citizens with past. Among that rather numerous class here, Judge Wirt W. Saunders' life story is admitted to be the most remarkable.

The last act of Governor Penoyer, of Oregon, was to pardon Mr. Saunders, and the governor's message came near being too late, for the sheriff and Saunders had ascended the scaffold before the pardon came. That happened only seven years ago, just across the state line, in Oregon. Five years afterward Mr. Saunders was police judge of Spokane, and he is now one of the leading attorneys of the city.

The only incident for which any members of the bar have criticized him took place in the police court during his early struggles here. He was defending a man accused of vagrancy. At that stage of his career every case won counted. Saunders said to the police judge in the course of his plea: "I know this client of mine. I know that for three months he performed the hardest kind of manual labor. The testimony of the police that he will not work is quite untrue."

It was an unusual appeal, and the magistrate said: "Your testimony is sufficient to acquit him, and it is at that in his favor. By the way, Mr. Saunders, where did you know him?"

"He was my cellmate in the Oregon penitentiary, your Honor," replied Saunders.

The silence followed the answer was uncomfortable until the court apologized for the question. Saunders' answer was the first intimation the general public of Spokane had concerning his past. Shortly after this, Saunders made public a review of the case in which he was the defendant, and notwithstanding the rivalry that always exists in municipal elections, the story of his life in Oregon was not referred to by his opponents when he was conducting the campaign that made him police judge. Judge Saunders is a Texan by birth. He is disgraced, and affects the typical Southern apparel. His most intimate acquaintance would not take the liberty of asking him anything about his narrow escape from the scaffold, and he is said to be averse to discussing it, just as one is loath to recall some horrible dream. From time to time, however, to prevent rumor from being accepted as truth, he has found it necessary to make fragmentary statements.

Testimony was introduced at the first of Saunders' Oregon trials to show that he killed a man in Texas. How ever that may be, he went to Eastern Oregon when a young man, and opened a law office. His social gifts were highly appreciated by the isolated community where he resided, and within a short time he became an aspirant for the hand of the belle of the town. He had a rival, and one morning this rival was found dead in a mountain path, where it was said Saunders had been seen walking on the night previous. It was a plain case of murder. Circumstantial evidence accumulated against Saunders almost as rapidly as his friends deserted him. Within a few hours he was under arrest, charged with the murder. At the trial the judge admitted testimony tending to show that Saunders had killed a man in Texas. The jury found him guilty, and he was sentenced to the Oregon penitentiary for life. Saunders obtained a new trial upon the ground that the testimony as to the Texas homicide had undue influence upon the jury. It was excluded at the second trial, but he was sentenced to hang.

During all this trouble the young woman was so confident of his innocence that she promised to remain true to him a lifetime if need be. Great pressure was brought to bear upon the governor to issue a pardon, but the dead man had many influential friends, who presented counter petitions. Just what motives influenced Governor Penoyer at the eleventh hour will probably never be known, but there was great rejoicing in the bunchgrass town when the telegram forbidding the sheriff to go on with the execution was received. There were also ooties that justice had been thwarted, but sentiment has changed since then, and nearly everyone in that community, except the relatives of the murdered man, believe in Saunders' innocence.

The young people lost no time in changing their preparations for a funeral into arrangements for a marriage. Saunders and his young wife came to Spokane. Although they took no pains to conceal the ordeal through which they had been, in some way or other it did not become generally known. When the story became public it did not change the attitude of the public toward the couple, and at this time there is probably not a

man in Spokane who does not look upon Judge Wirt W. Saunders as one who came near being a victim of circumstantial evidence. He has amassed a competence through his legal practice and lucky mining deals.

DOUGLAS REPUBLICAN.

State Ticket Close and Doubtful.

ROSEBURG, June 5.—Douglas county goes republican, except Rice, representative, and Gillette, assessor. State senator and clerk close, but favoring republicans. State ticket close and doubtful.

A JOKE.—Sunday's Salem Statesman: "A good joke is told on the Eugene team and its admirers. Last evening just before the joint political meeting was convened in Marion Square, the Salem Military Band appeared upon the street and played a few numbers to attract a crowd. The band finally moved to the Willamette hotel corner and no sooner had it begun a number until the members of the Eugene team and their friends congregated on the steps of the hotel, presuming that they were being tendered a serenade. The young ladies produced a banner with the words "Champions of Oregon" worked in the university colors upon a white background and had the same prominently suspended in front of the hotel. When the band had concluded a few selections, and moved on down the street some inconsiderate bystander informed the victorious team and its supporters that the band had been engaged and was playing for a political gathering. At any rate the Eugene people enjoyed the music whether it was specially intended for them or not."

ATHLETE HEATER.—The Salem Statesman says: The work of Heater, of Pacific College, Newberg, at the Athletic meet, was marvelous and excited the admiration and generous applause of the entire assembly. Heater was the sole representative of the Newberg school, and took first place in each of the four events in which he entered, winning in the aggregate 20 points. He entered the broad jump, pole vault, 220 and 120 yard hurdles. Heater will attend the State University at Eugene next year.

CORRECT.—Albany Democrat, June 5: "There should be a law against railroads permitting more passengers on a car than can be comfortably seated. It is not right to load a car until passengers have to hang over the edge, as was done in the trainmen's excursion yesterday."

INJURED AT WENDLING.—Fred Russell was injured last evening at Wendling by falling between two logs which closed on him. His head was bruised, and the right knee wrenched painfully. Mr Russell was brought down and taken to the home of his parents three miles north of Eugene. The injuries will cause Mr Russell to be laid up for several weeks.
