AMERICANS WOUNDED.

NEW HAVEN, June 7.—E. C. Benedict of

that the time has come for the
formation of a new political party,
based upon those economic principles
of government which have never been
controversial, but will stand for all
time as irrevocable as the constitution.
Mr. Benedict firmly believes that
such a party will be formed and that
it is destined to carry the country by
storm.

SHELL ROCK GRADE.—Travelers
familiar with the McKenzie road will
remember the small waterfall at Shell
Rock Grade. It is a small quantity
of water, but it falls down a rocky
slope several feet almost perpendicular,
at the upper side of the road. The
road bed has been built up, and on
the lower side there is a bank of
several feet below which the side of
the hill is steep and rocky. It is an
ideal place to frighten a horse, and
not a few accidents have occurred at
that point. Now after these many
years some good Samaritan of a road
superintendent has hauled a tree trunk,
in sections, and placed it along the
lower side of the road making it im-
possible for a fractious team to throw
a wagon over on the dangerous rocks
below.

FOSSIL CHOSEN.—At the election in

seat was voted for, the voters of the
county deciding by a majority of 200,
in favor of Fossil, where the local seat
of government has been located for the
past eighteen months.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Republican Majority on Joint
Ballot Will Be Twenty-four.

The next Oregon Legislature will
have 24 Republican majority. Later
returns make a few changes in the
list as published yesterday morning.
One Fusionist was elected in Clacka-
mas county, and a Republican in Har-
ney and Malheur. W. L. Wells, Rep.,
appears to have been defeated for
Joint Representative for Polk and
Lincoln, and T. M. Simpson, Fusion,
elected. B. F. Allen, Fus., won in
Clatsop county. Elmer E. Mallory is
the second Republican elected in
Multnomah. The standing of the

Great Victory.

the incomplete returns 2947, and
Monday's in the Second, 8455. The
legislature is republican on joint
ballot by a majority of 24.

As It Now Stands.

Last night County Clerk Lee, Jus-
tices C. A. Wintermeier and C. J. Dodd,
began the work of canvassing the
official vote of Lane county, but after
canvassing the vote of 26 precincts
found that the judges of election in
Camp Creek and Glentons precincts
had neglected to place a tally sheet in
the returns, and thereupon the board
adjourned. They will meet at 8 p. m.,
Saturday to complete the canvass.

The only interest attaching to the
formality of canvassing the vote is the
closeness of the county judge contest.
Of course it is to be expected that the
returns coming into the party head-
quarters would have some errors, but
these are as a rule minor, except in a
close vote. In the precincts canvassed
by the board so far, Kincaid gained
seven in Fall Creek precinct, and Knox
gained one vote in one of the Eugene
precincts, giving Kincaid a net gain
of six, or leaving him at present eight
behind.

CROOK COUNTY.—On the county
ticket, Smith, democrat, was elected
by 171, Conleton, democrat, for
sheriff, 151; Healey, democrat, for
commissioner, 227; Bogil, republican,
for school superintendent, 113; Poin-
dexter, democrat, for treasurer, 107;
Newson, republican, for surveyor, 15.
The republican legislative ticket
carried the county by about 100
majority. Mr. Poindexter was sheriff
of Lane county for four years.

ALASKA STOCK BOAT

How Shippers Get the Most for Their Money.

\$100 CATTLE RATE.

The Portland Telegram has the
following account of the steamer Des-
patch, which left Portland Wednesday
evening, loaded with stock and mis-
cellaneous freight for Cape Nome:

"The Despatch is a new steam lum-
ber schooner, converted into a stock-
boat. Stalls three feet six inches wide
have been provided for her, and the
animals will have as comfortable quar-
ters as any that have ever been given
by ships sailing from this port.

"Shippers of freight try all kinds of
tricks to defraud the transportation
companies. Cattle are charged \$100 a
head freight. To beat this arrange-
ment the largest-sized critters procur-
able are included in the lot. One steer
weighs about 2400 pounds, and
measures three feet six inches expanse
between the tips of the horns. This
measurement is exactly the same as
that of the stalls, and a partition will
have to be removed in order to allow
the animal an opportunity to lie down.

"Another trick of taking advantage
of every available inch of space was
discovered. Piping is charged for
according to the space it occupies. A
shipper completely filled a large pipe,
about 10 feet long, with oats. He was
even seen ramming the feed down in
the manner of loading a cannon. It
was legitimate business, though, since
the space the pipe occupied was paid
for anyway. Again, a small sized safe
was stored with quicksilver, giving it
enormous weight, considering the
size."

The Hessian Fly.

We take the following from the
Pendleton EO:

"Some of the farmers who have fall
grain in the vicinity of Farmington,
Eastern Washington, are complaining
of the damage being done to their
crops by the Hessian fly (Cecidomyia
destructa). This is a dipterous or
two-winged insect, the larva of which
often proves extremely destructive to
wheat in this country. It is black
with dusky wings, darker at the base,
pale-brown legs, with black and hairy
antennae. There are two distinct
broods each year, the larva of one
brood living at the roots of the plants
throughout the winter, while those of
the other are found in the lower joints
of the straw about the end of spring
or beginning of summer.

"The roots of the wheat affected by
the Hessian fly are found to be decayed
or moldy, while the blades and stalks
are partly withered and shriveled. The
plant has a sickly appearance at first,
and it soon withers and dies.

"Thus far only the fall sown grain
seems to suffer from the effects of the
insect, but it is already evident that
the yield of grain in this vicinity will
be somewhat reduced on account of
this destructive pest."

It is possible our fall wheat has
attacked by the Hessian.

HODGES DEFEATED.—Returns from
the Crook county election on the coun-
ty clerk are that Arthur Hodges,
present incumbent, and continuously
in the office for twelve years, has been
badly defeated. Hodges was elected
as a democrat, but for some cause
followed the lead of the lamented
Grover and was repudiated by the
party when the convention met in
Prineville and made nominations a
couple of months ago. Hodges then
came out as a gold democrat candi-
date, and was taken up and nominated
by the republicans. The fight was a
litter one, and resulted in his being
badly defeated last Monday.
