BATTLE OF BOXERS

American Control of Colonies
Is Outlined.

S. P. BRAKEMAN KILLED.

PEKIN, June 8.—A heavy battle oc-
curred near here. Four thousand
Boxers surrounded 1500 Chinese within
30 miles of this city, and the result
of the fight which occurred cannot be
given, but it is known to be disastri-
ous. It is believed in diplomatic
circles that the empire will be forced
to withdraw her support from the
anti-foreign movement.

FOREIGN POLICY

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Hawaii has
been ordered under the jurisdiction
of the interior department. The
governor-general of the Philippines has
been ordered to appoint a commission
to revise the tariff.

These two orders do a great deal to
settle in the minds of the people the
manner in which the outlying colonies
will be handled by the present admin-
istration.

LONDON, June 8.—Consul Holli-
has had an interview with President
Paul Kruger. He was the bearer of
a friendly dispatch urging the Trans-
vaal to make peace. How this
message will be considered has not
been made public. The only house
in Pretoria struck by an English
shell during the bombardment was
the American consulate. No par-
ticular damage was done.

S. P. BRAKEMAN KILLED.

SALEM, June 8.—Joseph J. Philip-
head brakeman on one of the Southern
Pacific overland trains was killed to-
day by falling wood. The accident
occurred at a siding between Marion
and Jefferson, while loading the
engine tender. Phillips was about 28
years old, and is thought to live at
Roseburg.

A CHAPTER OF HORRORS.

Child's Head Cut Off and Eight
Men Killed.

MILWAUKEE, June 7.—An evening
Wisconsin special from Green Bay
says.

A terrible accident occurred near
Stockbridge, on the Oneida Indian
reservation, which resulted in the
killing of eight men and one child.
According to the story as brought in
from the reservation, a woman went
out into the yard where several little
children were playing, caught a chick-
en and chopped off its head with an
ax. She left the ax lying on the
ground. Immediately on her return
to the house one of the children
suggested they play chicken, and pro-
ceeded to carry out the suggestion. A
child was seized and its head placed on
the block and hacked off.

A number of men were engaged on a
derrick in the yard, raising heavy tim-
bers in the erection of a barn. When
the men above noticed the child being
beheaded, they became panic-stricken,
and in the confusion, heavy timbers
which were being raised, fell with an
awful crash, killing eight men.

Last to Leave Dawson.

Between the breaking up of ice in
the Yukon river and the resumption
of steamer navigation trade to and
from Dawson is hazardous. The
Skagway Alaskan of May 25 has this
about the last arrivals by that route:

"A Lobley, who has arrived in
Skagway, was one of the last men to
leave Dawson for the Coast this season,
and he relates a tale of hazardous
experiences. He started out with a
horse and sled, venturing to make
the trip over the wakening and
dangerous ice. Forty miles this side
of Sewyn his horse broke through the
ice. Mr Lobley went in with it, and
was severely cut about the face by
the ice. He scrambled out, cut the
tugs that held the horse to the sleigh,
and the animal sank to its death in the
chilling, sweeping stream. The sled
had remained on the edge of the
broken ice, safe. Mr Lobley walked
from the scene of the accident five
miles to a roadhouse.

"After drying out," said Mr Lobley,
"I took the Dalton trail to Hootchikoo,
then followed the U. D. cutoff to Lower
Lafarge, and then followed the shore
25 miles along the Fifty-Mile River to
White Horse, thence by the railroad
grade to Caribou and into Bennett
over the ice. The hardest work was
along the Fifty-Mile River. It was
a terror. I was 14 days coming out
from Dawson."
