MAY BE SHORT CROP.

An Oregon Dealer Reports Con-
ditions in California Yards.

It is reported the indications are
that there will be a short crop of hops
in California this year. If such a con-
dition should prove to exist, the prob-
lem of regulating the production of
hops to the demand may be solved
without requiring the organization of
growers for that purpose.

A J Ray, formerly connected with
the Oregon Hop Growers Association,
but now agent for J M Russell & Co.
of Portland, returned recently from a
trip to the hop districts of California.
In an interview Mr Ray imparted the
following information concerning condi-
tions in California:

"According to the most reliable
estimates at hand," said Mr Ray, "the
1900 crop will reach 45,000 bales. Last
year's crop aggregated 56,000 bales, of
which there are 500 bales unmoved in
the hands of the growers. Contracts
have been made for 8000 bales of the
new crop at from 2 to 10 cts."

"The different associations of Cali-
fornia met recently to discuss plans
for limiting the acreage and reducing
the yield, but each section was afraid
to trust the other and the thing fell
through of its own accord."

"The hop vines in California are not
half as far advanced as those in Oregon.
A great many hills have not yet
sprouted. The growers attribute the
backward growth to the ravages of a
cutworm, which eats off the shoots as
they appear above the ground. It is
the first appearance of this character
of worm, so far as known and puzzles
growers, besides causing them consid-
erable apprehension."

"While the crop is backward, it
must not be forgotten that the climate
of California is a 'forcing' one and may
mature the vine rapidly after they
once start growing. I was told that
vines tied up as late as June 23rd have
been known to yield a fair crop."

Mr Ray said that, according to his
latest advice, there were 10,000 bales
of hops remaining unsold in Oregon
and 1500 bales of these were unsalable.

The Heppner warehouses now con-
tain 1,750,000 pounds of wool, tells the
Gazette, and it is increasing every
day, as every road leading to Heppner
is lined with teams hauling in wool.
Some of it comes 100 miles by wagon.

Wool is arriving here from all points
of the compass and by rail and river
and wagon, states The Dalles Chronicle.
Over 2,000,000 pounds is already stored
in the warehouses, with a prospect of
six to seven millions before the season
closes.
