ties and personal preferences in giving the news. The Register is pleased to make an exception in the case of Sheriff Withers. In the Sunday morning issue it stated that "Andy and Frank Taylor two youths accused of burglarizing the store of Mrs. Bollman at Elmira appeared before Justice Wintermeier yesterday and were bound over," etc. The Register did not state facts. Those youth did not "appear" before Justice Wintermeier. They were brought before the justice in charge of Sheriff Withers.

In regard to the missing Glentana precinct election returns the Register does "not understand why the sheriff or his deputy did not go after the sheet in person." When the tally sheet of Glentana precinct was found missing Judge Potter at the request of the canvassing board wrote two letters to the Glentana precinct election judges requesting that the document be forwarded by mail at once. Those letters were signed by Sheriff Withers, at the request of Judge Potter, and duly mailed. It was no more Sheriff Withers' business to go or send a deputy to Glentana precinct after the missing paper than of the Register editor, unless the county judge or some other competent authority should make such order. Farther election judges have ten days time allowed them by law in which to make returns. That time has not yet expired.

The Register editor should read the law, else make inquiry of Sheriff Withers or Judge Potter then he might "understand" the situation. The implied censure of Sheriff Withers is unjust and entirely uncalled for. To all appearances it bears the stamp of malice.

FROM WILDERNESS TO CIVILIZATION.

At the annual meeting of the Umatilla Pioneer Association, at Weston, May 31, the well known pioneer, Rev H K Hines, D D, delivered an eloquent memorial address. We take a bit describing the transformation of the West from a wilderness to a land of happy homes and contented people: "I stood one September noonday 47 years ago on a prairie height,

not many miles from where we are met today, and looked far out on the misty sea of midday grasses, lying asleep over all the vale of the Columbia. All was silent as dim futurity. No voice in all that wild career of soundless surf and undulating waves that broke in bloom on the beach. No trace was seen of hand of man. There was no sign of life save a shadowy wolf fleeing over the land or a phantom hawk sailing in the sky, blue as a lovely maiden's eye, and deep as the soundless sea. Round the horizon from pole to pole the land, unmet, awaited the coming plowman's glad decree to laugh with plenty beneath his feet. I stood in mute amazement, looking across the hazy hills to the proud old monarch of the Westland, Mount Hood, standing in the hazy glory of his eternity; looked, and thought, and remembered; and wondered if the time would come when some later pilgrim, long after I was dead, would stand where I then stood, and see the old prophet's vision transmutated into historic fact over the lifeless plains before and beyond me.

"Yesterday I stood on the self-same mound of swelling surf. Lo! how the vision was changed! The land was a hum with the voices of men and the song of reapers, whose knives, keen as sickles, with clatter and dash swept into the drowsy-headed wheat; while, wide as a sea, green, yellow and brown, the grain fields endlessly rolled down to the far horizon. Hundreds of bright cottage roofs, like sails adrift on a boundless sea, islanded the far-away swells of emerald and gold. Distant spires of church and school lent music of bells to charm the old silence into the attuned harmony of reverence and intelligence. I felt the throb and thrill of the Nation's heart as I saw the railway trains shooting north and south and on to the seas, and lightning lines running here and there and everywhere in their subtlety, like pent-up things, to tell to city and country the marvelous story that the century has brought."

Quick Arrow Shooting.

The Maya Indians have acquired extraordinary dexterity with the bow and arrow, which, with the spear, is their only weapon, though the bows before they are strong enough to draw the bow often use a sling made from a strip of rawhide, with which they kill squirrels and small birds. The bows are about five feet long, made of a thin, tough strip of cypress palm, well seasoned. The arrows are usually carried in a tiger skin quiver and can be used with marvelous rapidity, as the following incident will show: A hunter named Canek had been on bad terms with his father-in-law for some time. One morning while hunting in the bush he espied the old man in an anaconda tree gathering the apples. The Professor's Foresight.

Professor Frederick von Martens, who holds the chair of international law in the St. Petersburg university and is a frequent representative of the czar in legal councils of moment, is not a Russian citizen, nor even a Russian subject, but a philosophic German.
