Young Murphy, of the S. P.

Bridge Gang, in the Marine Service.

Regarding the identification of the young man, Murphy, of the S P railroad bridge gang, recently drowned near the Hayden bridge, and who was known to have been in the U S navy, Coroner W L Cheshire has received the following letter:

OFFICE OF OFFICER IN COMMAND, Marine Hospital Service, PORT OF SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., June 9, 1901

WALDO L. CHESHIRE, M. D., Coroner Lane County, Eugene, Oregon.

Sir:—Referring to your esteemed favor of June 7, 1900, I beg to say, the record of this hospital shows that John McNulty, aged 29, nativity Ireland, was admitted to this hospital from the United States Army transport "Meade," February 13, and was discharged February 25, 1900.

On admission, in reply to the usual questions, he stated that he had no relatives, and this answer was recorded. I have no doubt that the young man, Murphy, referred to by you was the same McNulty. The newspaper slip enclosed by you, will be forwarded to the local press here.

CITY COUNCIL.

A Quiet Meeting Held Last Evening in City Hall.

The city council met Monday evening, President Mayor Harris, councilmen White, Roney, Peter and Abrams. The minutes were read and approved.

The usual bills were allowed.

J W White reported 8003 feet of lumber used in crossings, drain tiles and culverts.

A L Peter appointed superintendent of sewer.

Committee on fire and water was instructed to make contract for sprinkling of streets and allowing use of hydrants in securing water for sprinkling purposes.

A petition from property owners on Monroe street asked to have said street improved and graded between 4 h and 8th street. Petition granted.

Another petition was read asking for the grading and graveling of Lawrence street one block north of Chesser street and Chesser street one block east. Petition granted. This grading opens the streets to the new location of the Eugene Sawmill Co.

Committee on streets recommend the improvement of 13th and 14th streets to be made as asked for by petitioners. Report adopted.

Ordinance No 332 for establishing grade for improvement of 14th street was read third time and passed.

Ordinance No 333, to improve 14th street between Willamette street and Alder street was read a third time and passed.

Ordinance No 335 for the improvement of Alder street 950 feet to the northeast corner of Kincaid tract was read a third time and passed.

Ordinance No 336 establishing grade on Monroe street from 8th to 4th streets read third time and passed.

Ordinance No 337 to improve Monroe street from 8th street to 4th street read third time and passed.

Attention called to this: about the town that require cutting and getting out of the way. The marshal was instructed to notify the public to cut grass and thistles from the streets.

W K Scarborough asked the privilege of putting scales in front of his place of business. Referred to the street committee with power to act.

Street committee was instructed to employ help to cut thistles in streets and alleys.

A number of bills were read and referred to finance committee.

Adjourned to meet in special session next Monday evening.
