BOERS SCATTERED

ANOTHER BOER DEFEAT

LONDON, June 13—General Methuen and Kitchener's troops met the Boer army under General Dewett yesterday and an engagement resulted in the defeat of the Boers. The Boers are scattered in all directions and their commands no longer have a semblance of organized troops.

WILL FORCE ORDER IN CHINA.

LONDON, June 13—The allied powers will co-operate in forcing the Chinese government to preserve order and protect foreigners in Pekin and throughout Chinese territory. Russian troops are the only available ones, and if necessary they will be used to restore order.

BRYAN AS A TAXPAYER.

LEG BROKEN.

Fire Warden Hubble Run Over By the Chemical Engine.

When the fire bell sounded this afternoon all the apparatus belonging to the fire department in the City Hall was unhoused and started to the fire, all of the same being drawn by 3 a.m. Just as the chemical engine turned the corner of Eighth street into Willamette Fire Warden M B Hubble attempted to get onto the engine by running in between the wheels. By some manner he was knocked down and the hind wheel of the machine run over his left side, including his face and leg. His right leg was broken between the knee and thigh and his right arm was considerably bruised and the side of his face skinned. He was picked up by Dr D A Paine set the limb and dressed the wounds. The many friends of Mr Hubble extend their sympathy. At the time of going to press he was resting easily.

WINNIE THORN ABDUCTION CASE.

Brakeman B F Harvey of Junction City on Trial at Roseburg Yesterday.

Our readers will remember the abduction of a young girl at Latham by brakemen on a freight train, a few months since, and the abuse which followed while she was kept on the trains and at Roseburg. One of the brakemen Hugh Patterson is now serving a term in the penitentiary for the crime. The Roseburg RvI w of yesterday, June 12, has this account of the trial of another defendant, B F Harvey of Junction City.

"The circuit court is occupied today with the case of State of Oregon vs B F Harvey, the defendant being charged with rape on the person of Winnie Thorn. This case arises from the same affair for which Hugh Patterson was convicted on the same charge at the March term of court. It is alleged that the crime was committed on board a freight train early in January, the accused being brakeman on the train.

"The taking of testimony was concluded at 4 p. m., considerable evidence taken in the former trial not being admitted at this time. The case will be argued and may be given to the jury tonight."
