At 12 o'clock, Mr Lunch was announced, and all repaired to the G A R Hall where all were served with lunch and coffee, and all enjoyed themselves for three-quarters of an hour.

At 2:30 o'clock Mrs Livingston arrived on the southbound train and was escorted to the Hall, where the ladies were in session, and conducted to the chair, when the command was turned over to her, and amid great applause the ladies bade her a hearty welcome.

As we go to press the work of the convention still goes on and a good number of candidates await obligation until the entire convention return from a visit to the State University at 5 o'clock p. m. Forty-one comrades have thus far been obligated into the order.

THE PROCESSION. This forenoon, at 10:30 o'clock the Lane County Veterans Association made a street parade. The noble band of men that fought so valiantly from

'61 to '65 was headed by the drum and fife. They made an impressive appearance as they marched up Williams street. There were 77 Veterans and 35 members of the Ladies of the G A R. They gave three cheers for the ladies' organization and disbanded.

LUNCH SERVED. At noon J W Geary Post No 7, served lunch to the visitors in their hall and the same were relished by all present.

PROGRAMME. "Wednesday evening an old fashioned Camp Fire will be held, during which the Ladies of the G A R and Sons of Veterans will install their department officers-elect.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

The Lane County Veterans' Association, this afternoon, passed the following unanimously, and asked that the same be published in the county papers.

We, a committee of the Lane County Veterans' Association, having been duly chosen to inquire into the case of Franklin B. Wilson, an ex-soldier of the Second Iowa Infantry, who, having been severely wounded in action during the Civil War, is now in custody, and has been committed to the Insane Asylum, do assert that the facts are as follows:

While we consent that he is peculiar, he is not crazy, but suffering long years from wounds, and not receiving proper sanitary care is now in a helpless condition, and no doubt his days on earth are few. The Grand Army was in annual reunion at the time said commitment was made.

Resolved, By the Lane County Veterans' Association and all soldiers of all wars, that this is not only an injury to a veteran, but an insult to old soldiers, and humanity at large, and hereafter we demand through courtesy, if nothing more, that we be consulted in matters of like kind.

All secret orders are consulted when members of their orders are in question. Why was not the Grand Army conferred with? Are we not entitled to the same courtesy as other societies. While we admit that we are falling in numbers by the hand of time, we are not falling in fraternity, charity, and loyalty, one to another.
