Present—Judge R. S. Bean, president; J. J. Walton, Secretary; Guy Hovey, treasurer; Regents Dolph, Butler, Beckman, Hamilton and Friendly.

The following officers were re-elected: R. S. Bean, president; J. J. Walton, secretary, and Guy Hovey, treasurer.

Prof. E. B. McElroy resigned his professorship.
Two instructors, to be recommended by Dr. Strong, was ordered employed. They are: Joseph Schafer at \$900 per year and Henry D. Sheldon or M. Triplet at \$1,200 per year. After routine business the board adjourned.

WALDO SKINNER.

Our Oldest Citizen Passed Away
This Morning.

Waldo Skinner, after a brief illness, died in this city, this morning, aged 91 years, 8 months and 1 day. He was probably the oldest citizen of Lane county.

He was born in Woodstock, Conn., October 13, 1808. He came from Iowa to Oregon in 1888. During his lifetime he lived in a number of states. His only surviving child is George H. Skinner. Waldo H. Skinner, deceased son, formerly resided here as also did his daughter, Beulah, wife of T. W. Martin.

The funeral will take place from the residence of W. F. Martin, Friday, June 15, at 2 o'clock. Interment in the Mulkey cemetery.
