THE HESSIAN FLY.—James Ebbert, one of the best farmers in Lane county, informed us today that his fall wheat would not go over six or eight bushels to the acre. The Hessian fly or whatever it may be that is afflicting the plant, has eaten away the large roots and only the finer ones are left. Mr Ebbert says the oats and spring wheat begin to show signs of being similarly affected. The heads of the wheat are very spindling and many of them do not give promise of carrying any grain whatever. Mr Ebbert says the present rain will help crops greatly, though more is needed.

National Educational Association.

This great convention of teachers will be held at Charleston, South Carolina, July 9 to 15. A strong effort will be made to bring the Association to Portland next year. Prof McElroy, of this city, and Supt Rigler of Portland, will leave for the East about July 1, and hope to secure the attendance of other active teachers from this state.

The meeting held at Los Angeles last year, was attended by 15,000 teachers, 10,000 of them coming from the states east of the Rocky mountains. The Oregon delegation expects to receive the support of the delegates from the southern states, and the New England states all of whom were favorable to Portland two years ago. Prof McElroy will examine into the merits of two or three business offers during his eastern trip.
