LANE COUNTY ELECTION.

State Journal, June 16.

"The official count for Lane county was completed last Thursday, June 14. It shows that more votes were cast in Lane county for county judge than for any other office on the state or county ticket 97 more than for congressman, 133 more than for supreme judge, 681 more than for dairy and food commissioner, 108 more than for district attorney, 264 more than for joint senator, 43 more than for county clerk, 41 more than for sheriff, 152 more than for county commissioner, 170 more than for treasurer, 138 more than for assessor and 139 more than for school superintendent.

"This extraordinary vote is accounted for by the fact that the Republican managers—not the substantial Republicans, many of whom voted for the citizens' candidate—made their whole fight against the citizens' nominee for county judge and declared they would sacrifice every other man on the Republican ticket to elect the Republican nominee for county judge, and by so doing beat their sheriff, treasurer, and school superintendent, and yet the citizens' nominee for county judge was elected over the herculean efforts of these 'offensive partisans' and against Republican pluralities of 449, 410 and 498, as shown in the vote for state offices. They are great managers!"

"President Strong of the U of O said on commencement day: 'The University of Oregon expects much of its graduates—purity of life and cleanliness of living. Eugene, The Dalles Pendleton and Baker City are close together in postoffice receipts, as shown by the recent readjustment of salaries, the same depending on receipts for the first quarter of the year. Each postmaster got an increase of \$100 in salary—Eugene to \$2100, Pendleton \$2200, The Dalles \$2200, and Baker City \$2300. Albany lags in the race, no salary increase for that office being reported.

The large number of range horses in Eastern Oregon, those that are unbroken and practically wild, ranging the large extent of wild

and unfenced country at will, may be appreciated from the statement that a Nebraska firm has contracted with a Umatilla man for fourteen thousand head, delivery to be made September 1, 1900. And thousands will roam the range after the filling of that large order.

It is stated that an invention has been perfected whereby for all motive power and domestic purposes of light, heat, etc., the sun's power has been so concentrated as to be easily utilized. This will be alright for the Willamette valley in summer, but in winter we would have to depend on water power. And there is no danger of a lack of that.

A Costa Rican Wonder.

"The National theater, at San Jose, Costa Rica, is a wonder," said a gentleman who has recently returned from that city. "In point of beauty it is said to stand third among houses of its kind in the world. It cost \$3,000,000 to erect, and the work of construction occupied many years. The design follows the Grand Opera House of Paris in a general way, although of course the building is very much smaller, and the material is white marble and Mexican onyx. The main entrance hall and foyers contain some superb pieces of statuary, and the decorations were done by European artists of reputation."
