Blue River Precinct.

Several candidates on the Union ticket, more particularly H K Kincaid, have cause to gratefully remember the vote cast for them in Blue River precinct. While the vote for congressman stood 15 to 16 in favor of the republican candidate, and 16 to 16 on supreme judge, evidently both party voters, H R Kincaid got 21 to Knox's 12; Withers 22, Hawley 12, Hill 22, Taylor 12; Patterson 21, Gilstrap 13; Miller 20, Bond 13.

The vote for Mr Kincaid was the more gratifying as his opponents had industriously circulated the report along the McKenzie river that he was opposed to county aid for road improvements. Only those who have traveled the important thoroughfare that follows the McKenzie for fifty miles can appreciate the effect of such a report had the voters believed in its truth.

APPOINTED GAME WARDENS.—R W Veatch of Cottage Grove, C J Dodd of Springfield, L R Livermore of Eugene and Sidney Scott of Eugene, forest wardens, have been appointed deputy game and forestry wardens.

Kincaid Elected.

Salem Journal June 15.

The friends of Hon H R Kincaid in this city will be glad to know that the venerable ex-secretary of state has been declared the next county judge of Lane county by a republican canvassing board after ten days delay and apparently some juggling with the returns.

The official count was made by a republican county clerk and two republican justices of the peace. This board started to make the count soon after the election but after proceeding for a time found that the returns and tally sheets from some precincts were missing. Kincaid's friends thought that this delay would result in his defeat and threatened to take the matter into the courts, but the canvassing board finally found the missing tally sheets and gave Kincaid a fair count and declared him elected.

That veteran fighting journalist and pioneer republican of Lane county (not modernized Mark Hannan) republicanism) is elected county judge.

Special from Eugene says. "Hon H R Kincaid, ex-secretary of state, was today declared elected county judge of Lane county by the official canvassing board, having one more vote than his opponent. The contest was very close, Knox, the republican candidate, having apparently a majority of a few votes on the face of the unofficial returns. As the official count progressed, however, several mistakes were found in the counting as unofficially reported, all favoring Mr Kincaid. When Glendale precinct was reached the tally sheets were missing and an officer had to be sent there to bring them and this delayed the count. The board is republican in politics and its official mandate will probably not be contested by the defeated candidate, Knox. The election of Kincaid makes the county court union in politics."

The Journal believes that Mr Kincaid will make Lane county an economical incorruptible official. He has a heart for the poor, a backbone for the aggressive elements of society, and the county government under him will not degenerate into a mere machine to favor the dominant powers.
