A splendid rain fell in Gilliam, Sherman, Morrow and Umatilla counties on Wednesday, last week, which insured abundant crops in those sections.

Reports come from the Palouse country that the Hessian fly is working on the fall grain and will damage it greatly. The scourge seems to be general in the northwest section of the country.

In many sections of California the rains of a few weeks ago made the hay crop so much larger than was expected that it is almost impossible to obtain hands to care for it. The wages being paid is \$1.25 per day and board.

Another timely rain. If those reports of the ravages of the Hessian fly happen to be overdrawn we should have a splendid wheat yield. And the rain should greatly increase the yield even if the insect scourge is as bad as reported.

Fire water brings out all the latent cruelty of the Indian character. Last week a gang of Umatilla boys were having a big drunk in Buttermilk canyon, Morrow county, and becoming offended at one of their party beat him to death with clubs.

Bliss of New York is said to be elated for the Republican vice-presidential nomination. Perhaps the president has some streak of superstition in his composition and would regard the campaign cry of "McKinley and Bliss" as indeed portending bliss for the nominees.

It is a little unfortunate for the prestige of McKinley prosperity that last month there was a larger number of business failures in the United States than in any other month of May since a record of such failures has been kept. The gross liabilities were larger than in any corresponding month.

Surrounding Sumpter, Baker county, within a radius of twenty miles are over two thousand quartz locations, twenty-five of which are large producers and two hundred others which have over \$3000 worth of development work done on them. Within the same radius are perhaps one hundred and fifty placer mines that are worked annually and pay well. Besides these mines copper has been located and mined in large amounts.
