## REGIMENTAL BAND.

The band, through a committee appointed for that purpose, Saturday placed an order for 20 instruments, which will be here by July 4. The instruments selected are of the famous Beeson make, and are purchased of Kobler & Chase, of San Francisco, through their agent H E Morris. The boys have also sent for a lot of new and popular music, including besides military marches, all the standard operatic selections and a fine list of dance music. A rehearsal will be held tomorrow night, with what instruments that can be resurrected, and by the time the new set arrives the boys will have a 'good lip' worked up.

The community seems very anxious to see this organization prosper, and it is through the generosity of Messrs F E Dunn, S H Friendly, Hampton Bros and F L Chambers that the boys are able to save a good discount and pay cash for the instruments. It is fully expected, however, that the military band will honor a requisition for the instruments, as it does for other National Guard equipment, thus relieving the band of an expense which they were necessarily compelled to incur at the start.

## BOHEMIA DISTRICT.

An Interesting Letter About Mining Work.

## THE CAMP IS ACTIVE.

The following letter appeared in the Oregon Mining Journal of June 16:

BOHEMIA, Ore., June 11, 1900. Oregon Mining Journal.—Bohemia is once more making an effort to leap forward as the leading camp of the Northwest, and from the looks of things now it will not miss it very far. A visit to the Helena mine alone will show to any mining man that there is something here besides talk. They are milling on 5 feet of ore that is averaging \$85 per ton, besides the concentrates, which run very high. The mine is equipped with a Hammond 5-stamp mill, a Challenge ore feeder and a Johnson concentrator, all working like a charm.

The old Champion mine has changed hands, and will commence new work on a larger scale by Eastern people.

The old Knott mine, on Grouse mountain, has commenced work again after lying idle for some thirty years. Everything seems to be going forward with new energy.

The Grizzly mine, on Grizzly mountain, have built a new boarding house and are working day and night. On the working level they have 5 feet of solid ore—gold, copper and lead. It is a bonanza. Samples from this mine sent to Swansea yielded 9 ounces in gold, 400 ounces in silver, 20 per cent copper and 35 per cent lead. This mine was sold to an English company on those samples. Price not given.

The Vesuvius mine, on Fairview mountain, which was bonded to Mr Park, is now back in the hands of owners again. They have struck the ledge on the lower level. The ore is free and high grade. Tests made give \$300 per ton.

The Music mine is running steadily with a full crew. They are laying new track to the California tunnel, as they have a large body of free milling ore in sight and on the dump. A new strike of rich ore was made in No 6, which they have been sacking up for shipment. They are milling on some handsome ore from No 4. A plan is now being drawn to drive a tunnel into Bohemia mountain, from the west side, which will tap the Music ledge at a depth of 2000 feet. The Power Station will be at Glenwood, which is a fine location.

Mr Chas. Whaley, of Portland, just made a visit to his property on Monte Rico ridge. He has a large body of good ore. He has drove over 200 feet of tunnel, and will drive 500 feet this summer. Mr W has gone to New York but will return in three weeks with Eastern capital to purchase some other property.

Phelix Curria has just arrived with his outfit to commence work on his property on the east slope of Grouse mountain.

The Golden Slipper, Calapooia, River Side, and Capt Ely, with his bonanza on Horse Heaven creek are all working with full crew. The rumbling sounds of the heavy shots can be heard in every direction.

Then down the Champion canyon to the Lamra mine owned by the Leffoy Bros. This they call a prospect, but it is worthy of notice. From No 1 to No 5 level is exposed a large body of ore, ranging from 16 to 70 feet in width, showing good value across the entire ledge. Assays run from \$11.60 to \$266.80 in gold to the ton. They have a group of five claims; plenty of water and timber. It will require a large plant to work this property as it is a concentrating proposition.

Down the canyon one-half mile below is Mr Woods from Wisconsin. Calling on our new neighbors we found two little beauties of the fair sex cooking a meal. The boys are full of ambition digging for the yellow metal. They are new comers and we wish them success. They have a fine showing in sight.

New discoveries and strikes are being made all over the camp too numerous to mention. Freight teams and stages are pouring in every day loaded down with freight and passengers, prospectors and miners, and pleasure seekers, with their brushes and cameras to Bohemia and Grouse mountain, to sketch and view the snow caps of the Cascades and the surroundings of nature in its beauty. Why not come to Bohemia? We have plenty of large ledges of good value, good mines, good prospects and all the natural facilities and resources that are needed, and when a little money and energy is spent here like other places we will have one of the biggest and most permanent camps in the country.
