WOULD PROSELYTE BY FORCE

CHICAGO, May 16.—A special to the Tribune from Danbury, Conn., says: Missionary work was arranged, who recently returned from China, declared from the pulpit today that civilized nations must rule China.

"It is worth any cost in money," he said. "It is worth any cost in bloodshed if we can make the millions of Chinese true and intelligent Christians. I would cut all the red tape in the world and break all the treaties ever made to place the armies of the United States in the fore next to Great Britain. The open door must be maintained for Christianity as well as commerce."

So, after half a century of missionary effort, such a prominent authority as Bishop Cranston practically confesses failure. He would force the religion of peace, which he teaches, on the teeming millions of the Orient at the muzzle of the rapid-fire gun and repeating rifle. That same spirit of religious zeal and fervor fixed Mohammedanism on Africa and parts of Asia. If they refused to accept the religion they got the sword. But the sword is slow compared with the modern death dealing inventions that Bishop Cranston would turn against the Chinese.

A TREASURY SCANDAL

Proceeds of a Real Estate Sale Deposited in the Bank to Which the Property Was Sold.

On the third day of July 1899 the old custom house property in the city of New York was sold to the National City Bank, the Standard Oil Company bank, for the sum of \$1,500,000. The act of congress authorizing the sale clearly stated and specifically enjoined that the secretary of the treasury should deposit the proceeds of the sale in the United States treasury as miscellaneous receipts. That official left the money on deposit in the bank that made the purchase. Congressman Sulzer, of New York, in a recent speech threw light on the favoritism shown the Standard Oil crowd of millionaires by the McKinley administration. Mr Sulzer said in part:

"The secretary of the treasury left every dollar of the purchase price of this property with the purchaser, the National City Bank—that is to say the Standard Oil

bank—and it has been there from the day of its purchase down to the present time. I desire to call the attention of the country briefly to speech made by William McKinley, member of congress from the state of Ohio, on the floor of this house on February 29, 1888. At that time he was charging a Democratic secretary of the treasury with political favoritism in depositing government funds in pet national banks. The amount on deposit at that time with national banks was about \$59,000,000, and this is what Mr McKinley said:

"That Mr McKinley ought to be in the treasury today. It is now out among the banks and held by them, they giving to the government bonds as security for the deposit and are getting the money without interest. I charge the president of the United States and his administration with being responsible for this condition of affairs and for whatever congested condition we have in the treasury and whatever alarm prevails about the finances of the country. Every dollar of this money should be paid to relieve the government debt."

"What a difference between now and then! What a spectacle the record presents between William McKinley, the fearless representative of the people from the state of Ohio in 1888, and William McKinley, president of the United States in 1900, the mere agent of the Standard Oil trust, the most dangerous monopoly in all the land, and the greatest menace today to the stability of our finances and our free institutions. Today there are over a hundred millions of dollars of the people's money deposited by the secretary of the treasury with pet national banks and not drawing a penny interest so far as the people are concerned."

The opening of Lincoln street, on the side of the First Presbyterian church, from Eighth to Eleventh will greatly improve the appearance of that part of the town, besides adding to the convenience.

GAME BIRDS WILL BE PLENTIFUL.

Season is Promising for Chinese Pheasants, Grouse and Quail, Will Be Good Hunting.

"Native pheasants, Chinese pheasants, grouse and quail, will be plentiful this season, and the sportsmen of this section are looking forward to big times in the fall, when the season opens," says the Albany Herald.

"Mild weather during the winter and warm spring rains were boons to the upland birds. Few of the young ones died as a result of cold rains late in the season. Besides this, they had the protection of the brush and vegetation in the valley all kinds of game. Here in the valley all kinds of vegetation is several weeks in advance this year, and the game was full enough when it was most needed to afford protection to the young birds."

"The young birds are now between a quarter and three quarters grown. If the weather continues as it has been since the first of the month, the second brood will be reared in good shape. Quail and native birds will be more numerous this season than they have been for several years past."

CITY OF EUGENE.

Falls Into the Hands of a Logging Company for Tow Boat Service.

Portland Telegram June 16.

The steamer City of Eugene, which was recently purchased by the Spaulding Logging Company, is being thoroughly overhauled and painted at the levee. When the boat is ready to go into commission, she will be in better condition than she has been for some time. She has a good boiler and fairly good machinery in her, but her hull is ill-shaped, and her abilities as a towboat have never been fully determined. The City of Eugene has had an eventful career. She was built last year at Eugene by a S. M. Co. She operated with varying success until early this spring, when she was libeled by Isaac Gray et al for wages. Judgment was returned in favor of libellants, and the vessel was sold by the United States Marshal. She was bid in by Olsen & Co., who sold her to the Spaulding Logging Company.

Ashland Normal School Regents Criticized.

At a meeting of the regents of the Southern Oregon State Normal School at Ashland, Tuesday, Prof Wm Clayton was elected president of the faculty at a salary of \$1100 a year, over the former president, W T Van Scoy. The Ashland Tidings is very indignant over the action of the regents. It says in part:

"There is a general feeling of indignation in town over the dismissal of W T Van Scoy as president of the normal. There seems to be no element of gratitude left in the understanding of men who happen to hold a little brief authority and power. Out of the eight regents only two—R P Neil and L E Willis—voted to retain the man who built the school and maintained himself and family on a bread and water bill of fare for four years that the school might live and not die. Gregory led the fight, but it is quite likely that his name is being also used as a scapegoat to cover the perfidy of others. Everybody in town that expresses themselves at all are highly indignant and deeply sympathize with Mr Van Scoy and are unable to understand what cool-headed material some people are made of to be able to allow a man to pick the school out of the gutter and carry it through the starvation period of four years, and then not be allowed to recoup his last finances sufficiently to get out of town decently."

The S O S N school alumni association at their annual banquet at Hotel Oregon last evening made arrangements toward raising \$125 to assist the late president, W T Van Scoy, out of town. Nobody better understands the heart and humanity of Prof Van Scoy than the alumni.

Died.

Of old age in Grants Pass June 12, 1900, D E Knight aged 74 years. Deceased was born in the state of New York in the year 1826. Emigrated from there to Iowa in an early day, moved to California in 1858, and resided there until 1888 when he came to Lane county, Oregon, living on a farm west of Eugene. In 1896 he went to Grants Pass; to reside with his son, F H Knight with whom he lived at the time of his death.

In religion he was not an orthodox; but an agnostic—a pantheist, believing in the doctrine that the universe taken or conceived as a whole, is God; that there is no God save and except in the combined forces and laws, which are manifest in the existing universe. In speaking of his virtues, it is enough to say of any man, that he was industrious beyond his endurance, generous to a fault. His heart overflowing with kindness toward his friends and neighbors, a kind husband, an affectionate father. It can be truly said that the world is better for his having lived.
