CITY COUNCIL.

Considerable Street Business Was Transacted Last Evening.

The city council met last evening in special session, Mayor Harris, Councilmen Osburn, Luckey, Roney and Peter being present.

Ordinance No 332, establishing grade on Lawrence street, from the south side of Cheeser street north 327 feet to the north end of Lawrence street was read a third time and passed.

Ordinance No 333, for grading Lawrence street from the south side of Cheeser street, north 327 feet to the north end of Lawrence street, was read a third time and passed.

Ordinance 334 and 335 for establishing grade and grading Cheeser street from the middle line of Lawrence street east 367 feet to the west line of Lincoln street extended, was read a third time and passed.

Contract for sprinkling the streets entered into by and between West Bros for \$15 a month during the dry season, was approved by the council. The contract provides for deduction during the rainy weather.

A communication from the Fourth of July committee containing an invitation for the mayor and council to take part in the street parade and other festivities read. The invitation was accepted.

Councilman Peter, member of the street committee was instructed to call on the local manager of the street car line looking to immediate repairs on the center of the track.

After an animated discussion over streets and walks, wherein it was agreed that many walks are in need of repair, the council adjourned.

There will be more new residences built in Eugene during the coming summer than during any season for the past six or seven years.

The Boise, Idaho, Statesman says the Red Bird mine, near that place, has been worked to a depth of 400 feet by adit tunnels, tapping a succession of geyser-shaped chutes of soft carbonate of iron impregnated with lead-silver minerals to the value of about \$70 per ton. This mine has yielded \$600,000 worth of bullion to date and will turn out 3000 tons of high-grade ore this summer.

FOURTH OF JULY

The General Committee is Working Actively.

At a meeting of the committee in charge of the celebration on the 4th, held last evening, prizes for the races were allotted, and a number of races were arranged for. The committee has apportioned a certain amount for each event, and the winners will be given an order on some store in Eugene for the amount of his prize and will be permitted to make his own selection.

In this way no undesirable prizes will be put up, and the effect will undoubtedly be to stimulate interest in the sports of the day. The race purses are as follows:

Bicycle race, 1 mile, free for all. Purse \$12, three prizes.

Bicycle race for boys of 16 years and under, 1 mile. Purse \$9, three prizes.

Foot race, free for all. Purse \$9, three prizes.

Boy's foot race, for boys of 14 years and under. Purse \$6, three prizes.

Bicycle race, free for all, 1 mile. Purse \$14, three prizes. In this race stakes will be placed at Ninth and Fifth streets. The start will be made at Ninth; go to Fifth, turn stake back to Ninth, turn and back to Fifth, turn and back to Eighth street, the finishing point.

Pole vault, for which a medal will be awarded.

In addition to these prizes, the committee will give three prizes for the best decorated bicycles in the illuminated parade in the evening.

New features are being brought out for the parade in the evening, and this promises to be a very interesting feature of the day's program.

Prof Shaw, one of the best triek bicyclists in the United States, has been engaged to give an exhibition on the dance platform during the afternoon concert.

The committee is doing everything possible to bring out a good program for the entire day with the funds available but needs the hearty encouragement of the patriotic spirit that should be found among the citizens of Eugene.
