"A NATIONAL CALAMITY."

The phenomenal jump in the price of wheat during the past three weeks has been made the text of not a few "prosperity" editorials from our brethren of the Republican press. The editors would have their readers believe that gold standard-protective tariff legislation is responsible for better wheat prices. They ignore crop conditions that are solely responsible. Here is a Chicago dispatch, of June 22, that fully explains the wheat market situation:

"The Times-Herald tomorrow will publish the crop report, published by Snow, the crop expert, who has just completed a two week's tour through the states of Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota. He declares the situation a national calamity, and claims the wheat failure to be the worst ever known. He estimates the Dakotas are promising only 20,000,000 bushels each, and Minnesota about 35,000,000, a total of 75,000,000 against 200,000,000 last year and 225,000,000 in 1898."

LARGE POLE OUTPUT.

The handling and shipping of poles is a big business. In the United States 5,000,000 poles are used annually by telegraph, telephone and light and power companies. These poles represent about 150,000,000 feet of lumber. Michigan cedar furnishes the principal material while the Southern states contribute chestnut and cypress. On the Pacific coast the shipment of cedar poles east is yet in its infancy. Sand Lake, Idaho, has been quite a center for this class of trade.

The growth and development of the coast itself is annually requiring considerable attention. Lindsey Brothers, of Portland, have just closed a contract with a San Francisco firm for 13,000 cedar poles to be used in the erection of an electric line in California. This is the largest order for cedar poles which was ever placed on the Columbia river.

OREGON WOOD STATISTICS.

Forestry Agent Johnson informs the Portland Timberman that 400,000,000 feet of timber is consumed annually in the state of Oregon for fire wood. When it comes to notice that the city of Portland burned 137,797 cords of slabwood and cordwood last year, the estimate does

not appear very wide of the mark. The Southern Pacific, which burns wood exclusively on its Oregon lines, consumed some 60,000 cords alone last year, and will probably use 75,000 cords this year.

The Blue mountain wood camps cut 15,000 to 20,000 cords each, annually. This wood finds a market in Baker City, La Grande, Walla Walla, and even Idaho. The steamboats on the Columbia and Willamette rivers consume enormous quantities of cordwood and keep a small army of men employed in furnishing it.

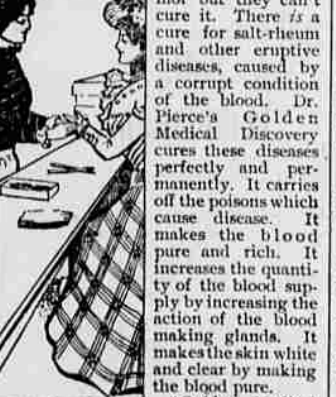

The objections to a straight fir door were on account of the pitch, weight and tendency to shrink and swell according to weather conditions. When care is exercised in selecting and handling the stock the objections are overcome. The combination door combines the lightness of cedar, with the beauty of fir. The thin fir veneer when cut from edge-grain lumber, and thoroughly steamed, eradicates the pitch entirely and makes a handsome door.

Cromwell Was a Ruthless Victor.
We must remember always that under Cromwell there was no burning at the stake, no dreadful torture in cold blood, and therefore at his worst he rises in degree above Philip and Alva. But in kind his deeds in Ireland were the same as theirs in the Netherlands, and, though the Puritan soldiers were guileless of the hideous licentiousness shown by the Spaniards or by the armies of Tilly and Wallenstein, yet the merciless butchery of the entire garrisons and of all the priests—accompanied by the slaughter of other noncombatants in at least some cases—leave Drogheda and Wexford as black and terrible stains on Cromwell's character.

Cromwell and his lieutenants put down the insurrection and established order because they gained such sweeping victories, not because Cromwell made merciless use of his first victories. It was the fighting of the Puritans in the battle itself which won and not their ferocity after the battle, and it was Cromwell who not merely gave free rein to this ferocity, but inspired it. Seemingly quarter would have been freely given had it not been for his commands. Neither in morals nor in policy were these slaughters justifiable. Moreover, it must be remembered that the men slaughtered were entirely guileless of the original massacres in Ulster—Theodore Roosevelt in Scribner's.
