EUGENE WATER COMPANY.

The New Pump and Motive Power
Being Used.

The Eugene Water Company has its
new pump in position and it is being
operated by the new water wheel
placed under the factory of George
Midgley. The power is transmitted
by means of a steel cable 1100 feet long,
which is carried to a tower near the
Southern Pacific track and from there
to the pumping station. The pump is
a Gould's triplet power and has a
capacity of 30,000 gallons per hour and
can be operated with ease under the
new system as long as desired.

Superintendent McMurphy states
that during June the daily average con-
sumption of water is about 150,000
gallons, but that during July and
August when so much water is used
for the purpose of irrigating lawns the
daily average will exceed 400,000 gal-
lons. Under the present system water
is not pumped as rapidly as it was
with steam power, where cost of opera-
tion had to be more closely considered.
Then water was pumped in about
three hours sufficient for a day's use,
now seven or eight hours will be taken.

The present board of directors is
composed of Dr T W Harris, presi-
dent, R McMurphy, secretary and
superintendent, J H McClung, treas-
urer, S H Friendly, Mrs R McMur-
phy. This board is progressive and
is sparing no pains to constantly im-
prove the service and perfect the plant
which is already one of the best in the
state.

The steam plant will be retained in
position, but will be used only in case
of emergency. S W Taylor, engineer
and in charge of machinery and mains,
continues to satisfactorily fill his
position.

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REV MCINTURFF IN COURT.

An Omaha Widow Sues the
"Bishop" for \$800.

"Bishop" McInturff, he was a plain
"Rev" when pastor of the Eugene
Methodist church, has been sued for
\$800 by an Omaha woman whose con-
fidence and money, she alleges, he
gained. The Spokane Spokesman-
Review has this telegraphic account
of the suit and the cause thereof:

"OMAHA, Neb., June 10.—Widow
Jane Miebie has filed a suit in the
district court against Bishop McInturff
of Spokane, Wash, charging him with
obtaining \$800 of her money under false
pretenses. The widow's allegations
are somewhat sensational. McInturff
borrowed the money last winter when
he was here for a month helping Rev
Charles W Savidge of the People's
church in a revival. Subsequently the
two pastors combined their churches
under the name of the People's United
church and McInturff returned to
Spokane, where his congregation
elected him a bishop.

"McInturff returned to Omaha Fri-
day and began leading independent
services. Today the widow asked
the court to compel the bishop to
restore her money to her and to answer
the direct and unequivocal charge of
getting the money through false rep-
resentations, alleging that the bishop
first got her to put up \$100 as a title
of her possessions, the money having been
paid her by an insurance company.

"Then the bishop called upon her
again, saying his church at Spokane
was in debt and the widow might
want to invest some of her cash for the
Lord's sake. Finally he called and
said he had been directed to her by the
Lord, who evidently intended that she
lend the money to the bishop. She
did so, taking his note, which she
swears she thought to be a demand
note, but it proved to be a five-year
note with interest payable every six
months after maturity."
