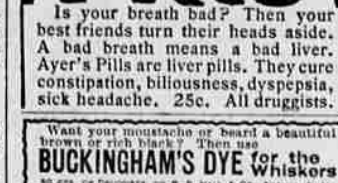

A EUGENE BIDDEN.—Several
months since floating lightship No 50
was thrown on the sands at the mouth
of the Columbia river. The govern-
ment invited bids for launching the
vessel into deep water and the bids
were opened at Portland Monday.
The lowest bid, \$11,750, was sub-
mitted by an Astoria man, The
Telegram's report of bidders gives
Harry Reeves, of Eugene, as a bidder,
making the offer to move the vessel
seaward for \$12,000, if allowed the use
of government appliances, \$15,000
otherwise, 60 days to be allowed for the
work. Some of the bids were for
moving the lightship across the sands
to Baker's bay.

Duplicate Courthouses.

It does not often happen that two
counties of the same state build cou-
rthouses on practically the same plans
to replace structures that were built
nearly half a century before and were
as like almost as two peas. Yet this
has happened in the case of Polk and
Lane counties.

The Dallas Itemizer prints pictures
of the old courthouse which was de-
stroyed by fire in 1898 and the new
courthouse which has just been ac-
cepted by the county court. The old
building was almost identical with
the Lane county structure, portico,
columns, cornices, etc. The only
points of difference shown in the pic-
tures are that the Polk county building
had no belfry, and had five windows
on each side, upstairs and downstairs,
while the old Lane county structure
has but four.

The new courthouses differ only in
size, the Lane county building being
ten feet larger each way. Otherwise
the plans are identical.
