SAVORS OF REVENGE.

It was not many months ago that Bryan toured Oregon and the Pacific Northwest and, though grudgingly, the Oregonian was compelled to give at least a partially correct report of the crowds that flocked to see and hear him. It is not relish the job, but, as we escape the responsibility that attaches to honest, conscientious journalism.

The thousands who heard him will be astonished to read in the Oregonian—should they scan the editorial columns—that "he," Bryan, "has fallen somewhat into contempt as a 'finhorn' political gambler." Still the Oregonian has some cause for a personal attack on Mr. Bryan, though none for failing to tell the truth. Mr. Bryan removed not a few patches of Oregonian editorial hide during his speech-making tour of the state. And it was not resented at the time—not until Bryan was well out of the state.

The unanimous voice of Silver Republican, Populist and Democratic state conventions held since Bryan was nominated for president by the national conventions of those parties four years ago is ample proof that the Oregonian statement that Mr. Bryan "has fallen somewhat into contempt" not only lacks the essential element of truth, but bears the stamp of malicious perversion thereof.

THE "BOXERS."

The Chinese "Boxers," who are startling the world with atrocities inflicted on missionaries and other foreigners, says the San Francisco Post, have a membership running into the millions. The recent outrages were perpetrated in the maritime province of Shan Tung, which lies south of Peking. This province, though smaller than the state of Washington, having an area of about 50,000 square miles, has a population closely estimated at 35,000,000.

As in the case of the vigilantes, organized in the lawless days of placer mining, the society of "Boxers" was originally formed with a commendable purpose. It was organized to deal with bands of native robbers, but later became an instrument of private revenge, and later still for venting the Chinese

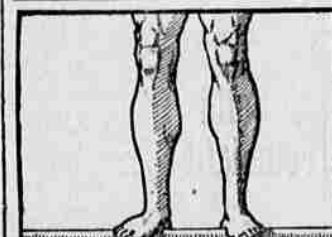
hatred against "foreign devils." Originally the "Boxers" were the Brotherhood of the Strong Sword (in Chinese Ta Too Why) and accomplished good work in the interest of law and order. Its membership is largely composed of ignorant Chinese and intriguing men, who desiring the checking of foreign influences work upon the ignorant masses with assertions that the missionaries are opposed to the veneration of ancestors, and murder Chinese children to obtain certain organs said to be used in witchcraft.

The Associated Press states that ex-Governor Taylor of Kentucky, wanted by authorities of that state on charge of complicity in the assassination of Governor Goebel, was in Philadelphia the other day. Two detectives acted as a personal guard while two officers, representing the state of Kentucky, followed close at his heels with a warrant for his arrest. The Associated Press reporter naively adds that his "stay in Philadelphia was devoid of personal pleasure." No one will question the truth of such a statement.

The modern perfecting newspaper press prints and delivers a complete paper from large rolls of paper that are tightly wound about a core. The New York Sun says passers-by who see the large rolls being unloaded at its pressrooms make varied guesses as to the length of the paper sheet, ranging from one thousand to ten thousand feet. As a matter of fact there are four miles of paper, twenty-one thousand feet, in each roll.

AMENDMENTS LOST

Woman Suffrage and all Other Propositions Defeated in Oregon.

OFFICIAL RETURNS FROM ALL COUNTIES.

Salem Journal, June 26.
Secretary of State Dunbar has received the official election returns from Curry county, and now every county has reported the results of the elections. The returns are not complete, however, for the reason that some of the returns have been sent back for corrections, and Curry county failed to transmit the transcript of the vote for state officers. The missing sheet may arrive in a few days. The clerks in the secretary's office are busily engaged in tabulating the returns.

The total vote on the amendments is as follows:
To remove municipal indebtedness limit, for 18,147; against 26,575.
To increase number of supreme court to five, for 15,208; against 26,262.
To give irrigation companies power of eminent domain, for 18,346; against 26,324.
To repeal prohibition against colored men, for 19,074; against 19,069.
To give women suffrage, for 29,265; against 28,402.
