THE STORY OF TSI AN.

Daughter of a Manchu Noble—
Sold to a Wealthy Merchant—
Chosen Empress of
China.

The Dowager Empress of China, Tsi An, who is charged with bringing on the crisis now impending in her empire, is the daughter of a Manchu noble, who, becoming bankrupt when she was a child, sold her to a wealthy merchant of Canton. When in 1848 Emperor Hien Fung issued the usual proclamation requiring eligible Manchu maidens to present themselves for examination as candidates for imperial concubines, Tsi An went to Pekin with others, and was among the first ten chosen. That she had brains as well as beauty is proven by her success in soon securing the especial attention and favor of first the empress, and then the emperor.

It was an important event in her life when, the empress being childless, Tsi An presented the emperor with a son; for in consequence of this she was proclaimed Empress of the West. Emperor Hien Fung died in 1860, and Tsi An's son became emperor as Tung Chi, the government being conducted by a regency, consisting of the two empresses and the boy's uncle. In 1874 Tung Chi, then 19 years old, sought to control affairs himself, and his mother promptly had him poisoned, as well as his wife and child. Kwang Su, a child four years old, was then proclaimed emperor, and soon after Tsi An removed her co-empress, Hien Fung's widow, by poison. Thus she was in complete control of the whole empire, east as well as west. Kwang Su grew up and assumed nominal control as emperor, but as soon as he began to exercise authority in fact, and contrary to Tsi An's wishes, he was dethroned and put into prison where he still remains, though why the dowager did not murder him is not explained.

Being of the Manchus, the empress is hated by the majority of the Chinese. She has directly murdered many, and it is supposed that she helped to foment the Boxer uprising, not only to rid the country of the hated foreigners, but to create an opportunity to kill off

a large number of her enemies. Tsi An is not an altogether lovable old woman, but her history makes an interesting study.

THROUGH ST. GOTHARD TUNNEL.

An American traveler writing from Rome, May 25, describes the passage through St Gothard tunnel, which pierces the boundary Alps between France and Italy, a wonderful climatic transformation: "As we neared St Gothard, it rained with an occasional flake of snow. All our wraps were needed, then suffered from cold feet and limbs. Scarcely a ray of sunlight was seen for a number of hours. We entered the great tunnel from an air almost as dark as night, and emerged in sixteen minutes, running apparently at tremendous speed, into the bright and balmy air of Italy. Such a sudden transformation can scarcely be imagined, less described. Car windows were opened, and such exclamations of wonder as passengers looked out into the clear blue sky and upon the snow capped mountains all about them with the green valleys far below.

NEW GOLD BEACH

On Alaska Coast 55 Miles Below Cape Nome.

GOLD IS AMONG GRASS ROOTS.

NOME, Alaska, June 8.—More definite and complete returns have lately been received concerning the beach strike at Topkuk, 55 miles below Nome. There seems no reason to doubt that this is one of the greatest strikes ever made in this vicinity, as important as the strike at Nome itself.

Though the discovery at Topkuk is of comparatively recent date, many have struck it rich already, and several individual fortunes, running as high as \$25,000, have been taken out. Parties of two or three working with ordinary rockers, it is said, are taking out \$1000 a day. One little plot of ground, just about big enough for a good-sized grave, yielded \$15,000 worth of the precious metal. It lay just at the edge of the tundra, and the gold was actually among the grass roots. It is reliably estimated that one stretch of beach 600 feet long by an average of 90 feet in width has yielded \$475,000 within the past few weeks.

Another strike, though of a less sensational nature, has been reported at a point on the beach about 20 miles south of Nome. At this last-named place and scattered along the beach between Nome and Topkuk over 1000 men are now at work.

This is little doing at present in this immediate vicinity, and some of the newcomers, who expected to pick up nuggets like shells on the seashore, are somewhat disappointed. Work is proceeding steadily on most of the claims, but there is no excitement just now over the news of the new strikes.

SOME GOOD RACES.

Take Place at Bangs' Park, Tuesday July 3—The Program.

An interesting race program has been arranged to take place at Bangs' park on July 3. Some fleet footed horses will be on the turf at this event. Entries will be for the following races:

Half mile dash, free for all. Purse, \$100—\$70 to first, \$20 to second, \$10 to third. Three-eighths mile dash, free for all, purse \$50—\$40 to first, \$10 to second. Quarter mile dash, for saddle horses, purse, \$25.
Entrance fee 10 per cent of purse. Entries close the evening of July 2nd. W. O. Trine will give an exhibition of half a mile with the famous pacing mare, Alma. Admission 50 cents, ladies and children free.

Russia is Our Commercial Friend

New York, June 26.—Adolph Rothstein, the Russian financier, before sailing for Europe, said of the Chinese Eastern railway:

"Up to the present time we have expended some \$40,000,000, but before completion an additional \$100,000,000 will be disbursed. The road will not be completed for, I should say, quite 15 months, as we find we shall have to bore a tunnel some four and a half miles long on the Russian side of Harbin, the headquarters of the railroad. The benefits which American manufacturers will derive in the shape of contracts will be most important. Mr. Witte, the minister of finance, has assured me that he will place no obstacle in the way of contracts being sent to the United States, which in diplomatic language I take it to mean that he might object to the filling of orders in other foreign countries. I am therefore safe in stating that possibly everything required outside of Russia will be purchased in this country."

Another Unfortunate Gone.

The Dallas Mountaineer, June 25.
"After being intoxicated for several days, 'Dickie' Wood, an inmate of a house between Court and Union streets ended her life by taking an overdose of carbolic acid about 7 o'clock last evening. As soon as her companions discovered what she had done, a physician was summoned, but she was past human aid when the doctor arrived, and she died at 7:40. The woman had been here only a few days, and had been drinking quite heavily. It is presumed she took the fatal dose after a disagreement with her lover. The woman's real name was Hurd, and her former home was Albany.

Two sisters of the deceased, Eva and Nettie Hurd, arrived here on the 12:30 train, and took the body to Eugene for burial."

Still Pressing the Sultan.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—As to the report from Constantinople that the United States charge, Mr. Gilson, has presented another demand for the settlement of the claims, it can be stated on high authority that this government is steadily pressing for a final settlement and is losing no opportunity to remind the Turkish authorities of the unsatisfactory nature of the situation. But beyond this persistent pressure there has been no imperative action taken, nor has it been definitely determined what course will be adopted if the temporizing of the Turkish diplomacy is carried to the point of failure to meet the American demands.
