through Morris & Crow from the well

San Francisco. The horns are of the
famous Besson make, silver plated
with satin finish. The band is work-
ing hard to get in shape for the en-
campment at Salem which begins
July 7 and expect to make themselves
known at that time.

The order for the instruments was
placed with Morris & Crow June 15.
The clarionets and drums were shipped
from San Francisco and the horns
from New York, and 14 days from the
time the order was placed they were in
Eugene. These gentlemen spared no
expense in having the order rushed
through, and the promptness is greatly
appreciated by the band.

JULY FOURTH.

General Committee Has All Work
in Hand.

LARGE CROWD WILL BE PRESENT

The general committee for the com-
ing Fourth of July celebration is get-
ting all its work rounded out in good
shape, and can announce with a
certainty that the program given this
year will exceed in quantity and
general excellence any arranged in
this city for several years.

The floats for the Goddess of Liberty
and Queen of the Celebration promise
to be unique and tasty, and will be
innovations in that line.

The various contests will have as an
incentive good prizes, and the com-
mittee asks that, if possible, all entries
be made before the Fourth, either to
W O Trine, F L Chambers, or to any
member of the committee.

The Skedunk parade will be one of
the neatest things ever given. Clever
takeoffs without number will be in
evidence, and no one should miss this.

For the bicycle parade five prizes, \$5,
\$4, \$3, \$2, \$1, will be awarded for the
best decorated wheels, allowing a large
variety for selection and originality in
choice of decoration. At least 750
wheels should be seen.

The morning parade will be formed
on Oak street, near Eighth. The line
of march will be north to Sixth street,
west to Willamette, south to Ninth,
east to Oak, south to Eleventh, west
to Willamette, north to Eighth thence
east to the park.

The morning exercises will be held
in the grove on the south side of the
southeast park.

All races will be run on Willamette
street.

The pole vault and trick bicycle
exhibition will be at the dance plat-
form north of Day & Henderson's store.
The Skedunk parade will tent a
circus. Don't go home without

The dance in the evening with
music by the Fourth Regiment band
will be a fitting close to the festivities
