TURNING DOWN OF MCAMANT

The La Grande Chronicle Prints Some Interesting Political Gossip.

Portland, June 30.—It is given out in select political circles that the turning down of McAmant at the Philadelphia convention was due to Mark Hanna. Certainly Senator Lodge is too courteous a gentleman and withal too unfamiliar with Oregon politics to have refused a delegate from this state a right to the floor, without such a course being dictated by a stronger man than he.

The whole facts are as stated in my former communication to the Chronicle that Mark Hanna has determined to use all the power of the administration to secure the election of John H. Mitchell to the United States senate from Oregon. The shrewdest of politicians guess that there is a good sized contribution to the national campaign fund by certain railroad influences subject to this absolute deal.

The quarrel between Simon and Hanna, the statement of the latter that he regarded Simon, Corbett and the Oregonian as the trouble breeders in Oregon Republican politics is now a matter of history.

A very close friend of former Senator Mitchell states that the latter is opposed to any compromise with Simon. His friends will ask for a caucus of the Republican members of the legislature and will state that they went into caucus and abided by its decision when Simon was elected. Either the Simon men will thus be forced into a caucus or justify their opponents in calling them bolters. They will caucus. Mitchell's strong card will then have to be played. Hanna will be forced to eliminate McBride—that genial gentleman and accidental senator—will be told by the national chairman to get out of the way—he will be offered a choice of a dozen lucrative positions and will yield.

The strangest part of it all is that Hon Charles W. Fulton, of Astoria, Mitchell's right hand man, and a man who has been twice defeated in his aspirations, once for congressman and once for governor by the machinations of Simon, urges Mitchell to accept of Simon's terms, which are the unanimous

election of Mitchell as Senator this time and of Simon, in case of a Republican legislature two years hence. Fulton, of course, would be the gubernatorial nominee—but, if Mitchell should defy Simon and win out, Fulton would be elated for the other senatorship two years hence.

Albany Herald, July 1: Benjamin R. Holt died at his home in Harrisburg, June 29, 1900, and will be buried in the family burying ground in the Lewis cemetery, about 10 miles east of Harrisburg, this Sunday afternoon. Mr. Holt was one of the early pioneers of Linn county and was one of her substantial citizens. He came here and took up a donation claim which he owned at the time of his death, as well as considerable other property. He was a man who took a deep interest in public affairs and was a material aid in building up Linn county. He leaves a wife and two sons, Carson Holt who is a druggist at Harrisburg and C. R. Holt, who is a successful dentist at Nome, besides all the old pioneers who knew him as friends. In his death Linn county loses one of her substantial and successful pioneer citizens.

The Cubans are begging General Wood for some specific information as to what this government intends doing, that is, they want to know what we are going to do toward giving them a stable government. If they were told the truth they would learn that it is the intention of the leaders to annex the islands if it can be done without shocking the moral sense of the world. But a way to accomplish this it is hoped can be discovered and not violate every principle of honor. The Cubans will soon realize that there is a powerful element in the dominant party that will insist on our keeping Cuba.

New York is the financial heart of the United States. This is aptly shown by the report of bank clearings for the week ended June 28. New York clearings were \$853,076,000 against \$609,671,000 for all other cities. Chicago is a big city but she had only \$140,623,000.

On the Fourth racing will be given over and tribal dances will be celebrated, including a war dance. One of the features of the Fourth will be a public dinner, to which everyone, and especially white friends are invited.

The catalogue of the Pendleton Academy, just issued, announces the date for commencement of the 1900-1 school year as September 10. Miss Katherine E. Hanna, of Eugene, will continue as teacher of the primary department.

The little town of Gervais, down in Marion county, will have two days of celebration. The 3rd will be devoted to bicycle and horse races and sports, while the 4th will have a lot of the same amusements with a parade and oration thrown in.

Astoria cold storage men have an agreement to pay five cents a pound for steelfish salmon. The other day a buyer offering six and one-half cents caused not a little agitation among fishermen and buyers.

The river steamers continue to be about a half a day behind on their regular run between Portland and Astoria. The amount of traffic was never known to be so heavy at this season. At Oakland, Oregon, this week J. W. Jones, of Elton, was fined \$50 and costs, by Justice Boringdon, for pursuing deer with dogs, in violation of the state game law of Oregon.

A \$75,000 hotel is being built in the little town of Nampa, Idaho. In 1890 the census showed but 347 population and it has not more than tripled since that time.

Captain J. W. Kern, a pioneer of 1833, and well-known resident of Portland, died suddenly Thursday in Philadelphia from heart disease, aged 82 years.
