DAY FOR EDUCATION.

Eugene Divinity School Discussed at Turner.

TURNER, Or., June 30.—This forenoon was missionary day at the big tabernacle of the Oregon Christian missionary convention, and, although a few had gone home, yet the newcomers had made up the deficiency in numbers and a large chorus assembled at 9 o'clock and their work gives assurance of good singing for tomorrow's services.

At 10 o'clock J. A. Bushnell, of Junction city, president of the board of regents of the Divinity School, read the scripture lesson and offered prayer. Rev. M. L. Rose of Eugene, secretary of education for the Christian church, presided over the session.

The first speaker was Rev. W. T. Matlock, of Carlton, who for two years was a student of the Eugene Divinity school. Mr. Matlock's theme was "The Work of the Eugene Divinity School." Although the students and faculty are working in heavy school work still the school is making a respectable showing as an evangelistic force. The students and faculty have preached over 600 sermons in the year; there have been over 225 additions to the church; \$300 was raised for the India famine; twelve protracted meetings held; one church building at Franklin, Ore., is being erected; six students were graduated this year—five of these were from Washington and one from Oregon.

Mr. Matlock was followed by Prof. D. C. Kellems, instructor in oratory and homiletics. It is not enough that a preacher have something to say, he must also know how to say it and how to make it impressive. Improvement in appearance and manner of speaking will keep ministers from being laid on the shelf. Young people will be better prepared to succeed if voice and body are trained.

Mr. John J. Handsaker, of the department of missions, then outlined the work of his department, which follows the plan of the student volunteer movement. This society originated at Northfield, Mass., in 1886, and entered the Eugene Divinity school in 1894. The

movement does not send out missionaries, but endeavors to raise up those who will purpose to become foreign missionaries, if God permit. In the second place, it attempts to lay an equal burden of responsibility for the world's evangelization in this generation, upon those who do not go, and to get them to pray, give and work for this cause. Mr. Handsaker teaches a class in mission study. He also spoke of the growing missionary library and appealed for funds with which to enlarge it.

Mrs. C. G. Eason '00, of McMinnville, spoke of "The Need and Advantages of a Course in the Eugene Divinity School for others than intending ministers." Mrs. Eason has recently been called to the assistant pastorate of the First Christian church of Eugene.

The Divinity school has also an excellent correspondence course, but as the director was not present no exposition of its courses was offered.

Rev. M. L. Rose spoke eloquently of the "Present and Future Duty of the Church to the Eugene Divinity School." In view of the work the school has already done, of what it promises to do, of its growth necessitating more teachers and better equipment, the duty of the church is to support the school in every way possible by sending students to it, by giving to its immediate support, by prayer and by bequests.

Rev. Rose cited the case of a lady in Washington who recently bequeathed \$300 to the school, as an example well worthy of imitation.

The national presidential election will be held November 6. State elections will occur this year as follows: Alabama, August 6; Arkansas, September 3; Georgia, October 3; Maine, September 10; North Carolina, August 2; Vermont, September 4.
