JULY FOURTH

The Day Seen From a Distance of 24 Hours

WAS A PLEASANT CELEBRATION

It rained. Eugene celebrated. The sun shined. Eugene celebrated.

Climate conditions do not affect the average resident of the Willamette valley nor stop them in the pursuit of pleasure. The Fourth opened up gray and cloudy, which thickened into a mist that was drizzling, afterward into rain, Oregon rain. Early a goodly crowd began to arrive in the city, and as the deluge began standing room in stores, hotels and under awnings was at a premium. All were good natured and awaited the pleasure of the general committee as to the disposition and amusement of the crowd. It became apparent that the parade would have to be postponed, and the date was changed from 10 a m to 2 p m. The Fourth Regiment and Pleasant Hill bands were then called on and gave street concerts until the noon hour.

The parade was held at the postponed hour and proved to be a success. Every care had been taken with all their floats, the Goddess of Liberty, Queen of the Celebration and Uncle Sam looked their parts, the bands played stirring music. Grand Marshal Matthews and aides acted promptly and nothing dragged. The postponement did not detract from the pleasure the parade afforded.

ORATION AND EXERCISES.
The exercises in the park were very interesting and instructive. Music was furnished by the two bands and a chorus. Dr T B Ford delivered the invocation. Professor I M Glen read the declaration of Independence. Rev Mac H Wallace delivered the oration. It was masterly and patriotic. He breathed the spirit of duty to country, duty to self, duty to God. It commended the acts of our forefathers and was optimistic of national future in the hands of the people of today and those who will come after them.

CONCERT AND SPORTS.
After the exercises in the park a concert was given at the dance platform by the Fourth Regiment band, during which time Professor Shaw, trick bicyclist, gave an exhibition which was marvelous. He is well versed in all those tricks of control of the popular vehicle.

The pole vault was also had at the same time. It was won by Loris Johnson. Height, 8 feet 9 inches. C W Jackson was second. The other contestants were C Smith and Homer Robb.

HOSE RACES.
The two hose races, held on Eighth street, proved very interesting in spite of accidents to each team. As it was the Rescues have one to their credit and the Cyclones one.

The wet test was won by the Cyclones in 32 seconds. The Rescues failed to get their hose unreeled and did not get water.

The hub and hub race, 100 yards was won by the Rescues in 16 seconds. In this race the ropes of the Cyclone cart broke, thereby letting them down.

THE SQUEDUNKS.
At 7 o'clock the Squedunks appeared on the streets and for quite a little time interested the people with their parade. A number of very excellent takeoffs were made, and this part of the program proved a success.

BICYCLE PARADE.
The next thing was the bicycle parade. If there is an enthusiast in the world it is the bicyclist. As a result the wheels were decorated in beautiful and in some instances almost impossible manner. The riders should make more of a feature of this part of a celebration. Instead of 250 or 300 wheels in a procession in this city, there should be 1,000.

THE DANCE.
The dancing on the open air platform was conducted better this year than ever before. The marshals kept the crowd off the dance floor and the dancers had a chance to enjoy themselves, which they did most thoroughly. The Fourth Regiment band furnished the music. The dance lasted until near the midnight hour, when tired nature asserted itself, and all wended their way homeward, content with the ending of a peculiar yet enjoyable celebration.
