## POULTRY ASSOCIATION MEETING.

Important Business Done—Dates  
for Annual Exhibit Agreed  
Upon and Judge Selected.

The Willamette Poultry and Pet Stock Association is demonstrating the fact that it is alive and of a prosperous nature. A meeting of the executive committee was held in Eugene July 4th, and a proposition from W W Browning, of Ogden, Utah, to judge the association's next exhibit, which will be December 27, 28 and 29, 1900 was accepted.

B F Keeney was appointed superintendent of show and is instructed to use all diligence in making up an exhibit among breeders and fanciers of both poultry and pet stock, that the association may make one of the best exhibits that the state has ever known. Mr Browning, the judge selected, is a man of wide reputation as a successful judge and breeder. He has judged for numerous shows in the northwest and gives good satisfaction. He and F W Hitchcock, of Denver, Col., will place the awards of the Oregon Poultry Association show in Portland next January.

The president, J O Watts, has called a meeting of the association to be held in the court house, Eugene, on Saturday, July 21, 1900, at 1 o'clock p. m., at which it is urged that all members, as well as those wishing to become such, be present. The Belgian hare breeders and fanciers are particularly requested to be present on the above occasion.

H L Martin was appointed to prepare form of circular of announcement of the show and to report at next meeting.

The present officers of the Association are: J O Watts of Eugene, president; G G Bells of Rowland, vice president; J M Kitchin, of Irving, secretary; Amos Wilkins, of Coburg, treasurer; A W Bond of Irving, H L Martin of Eugene, B F Keeney of Goshen, members of executive committee.

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## THE ENCAMPMENT.

Sunday Will Be a Big Day at Salem.

Eugene is becoming military again. Colonel Geo. O. Yoran and staff, the Fourth Regiment band, companies A and C are getting ready to attend the encampment at Salem, beginning tomorrow. They will leave here tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock, and will be in camp eight days.

Salem is making every effort to entertain the Guardsmen, and they anticipate an interesting and profitable camp.

The camp will include two regiments, the Third and Fourth, and the separate battalion of Eastern Oregon. Special attention will be given the movement of battalions and regiments, and the efficiency of the guard will be greatly improved as a result of the camp.

The Salem Journal of yesterday has the following regarding the encampment:

Salem is fortunate in securing this encampment which will be the greatest yet held. It will draw thousands of visitors from all over the state to this city. Elaborate preparations are being made by the hotels, restaurants and boarding houses, for the proper accommodation of the expected crowds and visitors will have no reason to complain of their treatment.

On Sunday next, the second day of the encampment, the popular excursion of the Foresters of America will bring at least 3000 people to Salem, to visit the camp of the O N G, and an outdoor entertainment will also take place at the fair grounds.

## A Pioneer Dead.

SALEM, July 5.—Mrs Elizabeth Chapman, aged 80 years, 6 months and 19 days, died at her home in this city last night. She was an early Oregon pioneer, having crossed the plains with ox teams in 1848 with her husband, Caleb Chapman, who died here in 1892.

Mrs Chapman has lived in this county since 1848, and in Salem since 1863. She left two daughters—Mrs Hattie Jackson and Mrs Sadie McFadden—in Salem, and two sons, J A of Middleton, Wash, and Caleb A at Walthburg, Wash. The latter was a soldier in the Second Oregon although he was over the legal age at the time of his enlistment.
