MASSACRED ALL FOREIGNERS.

Bodies Burned in Legations, the American Minister Included.

LONDON, England July 7.—The Massacre of all foreign-
ers by the Chinese in Peking is confirmed. The latest cab-
les says the bodies were burned to ashes in the legations,
the American minister Major E. H. Conger, of Iowa, being
included. The details published by the London newspa-
pers are terrible. They were slowly killed and then burned.

TROOPS ORDERED TO CHINA.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—Six thousand regulars
have been ordered to the Philippine Islands to relieve vol-
unteers and protect American interest in China. The
Washington authorities are fearful over the situation. A
cable from Consul Goodnow gives a little hope that a por-
tion of the legations are still alive in Peking.

FROM NOME.

Gov Fletcher, Late of Salem,
Says: "Stay at Home."

The following is from Gov Fletcher,
formerly editor of the Salem Inde-
pendent and a first class citizen:

NOME, Alaska, June 17, 1900.

I wish to say to my friends who

may contemplate coming to Nome to

stay where they are for the present

at least. Many are already returning.

The whole country is now in the con-

trol of looters, thugs, mine-jumpers,

sharks and thieves. People who

bought claims last winter find they

are now occupied by armed bandits

and they bid the owners defiance.

And so it goes. A few good mines

are not going to furnish employment

to 40,000 laboring men. The Salem

people here are all well, only one ex-

pression is heard from every lip—"Oh!

for a month of British law!" There is

no law here.

And the town. The streets filled

with great holes, and miners rocking

on sidewalks and middle of streets,

old barges and schooners run up Snake

creek and turned into hotels, gambling

halls every few feet with all the de-

vices known to man, saloons by the

hundred. Miners, prospectors, fakirs

and gentlemen all jammed together, a

few women pushing through the dense

throng here and there. We landed

on the shore in a cold rain, but no one

seemed to pay any attention to it.

Thousands that night slept on the

sand, some in tents and some without,

some under houses, some under boats

up side down, some under dry goods

boxes, some in saloons and some never

went to bed at all. The sun set at

10:30 and was up at 2 o'clock,

and the rest of the night is as

light as day only there is no sun.

Every night there is from one to two

suicides, but the shootings are not yet

numerous.
