MCKENZIE SUMMER RESORTS.Health and Pleasure to Be Found
on Upper McKenzie River.

(Continued.)

It is the way of the world that the
objects at hand and ready to be had for
the mere asking, or taking, are not
esteemed like others that require dili-
gent pursuit. Give the child the most
costly and elaborate toy and he will
throw it aside for one that is common,
provided it is found in possession of a
fellow.

This holds good with older children
that masquerade through life under
the garb of men and women. When
recreation and health is sought it may
not be found close at home. The fash-
ionables must hike themselves to
the sea-shore and coast resorts though
they freeze and suffer many of the dis-
comforts of life by reason of the cold
fogs, piercing winds, flying sands, and
crowded filthy kept summer hotels. For
the privilege of being "fashionable" they
endure more or less torment,
suffer and call it pleasure. The price
that must be paid for the self-im-
molated victims to the sacrifice. If
it was common and cheap they would
remain at home in preference.

Bountiful nature has provided the
favored residents of the Northwest
with grand rivers and mountains, a
sublimous summer climate that is
warm enough during the middle of the
day with cool and pleasant mornings
and evenings, and nights that have
not the least suggestion of summer dis-
comforts. Such conditions may be
found to a greater or less degree along
the many streams that find their
fountain heads in the Cascade moun-
tains. Prominent is the strong,
swift McKenzie that flows almost its
entire length within the confines of
Lane county. Its waters are fed by
lakes on the mountain summit, and
from the snow clad slides and glaciers
of the Three Sisters, companion peaks
that rear their snow-crowned heads
heavenward near six thousand feet.

Trout! Yes the finest and gamiest
trout that ever roared a fly or struggled
for life with an energy that seems
born of almost human intelligence as
to the dire catastrophe that must
follow capture, inhabit these waters.
The dark spotted or speckled mountain
trout, the red-side or more properly
speaking rainbow trout, attaining an
extreme length of about 24 inches,
and the "Dolly Varden" or salmon
trout, occasionally approaching the
twenty pound notch in weight, reward
the lovers of the rod and fly. And
there must be no mistakes—no bait-
ing in the motion that fixes the cru-
el hook, no releasing of the strain or ten-
sion with which the captain is held
until he is safely landed, else he tears
himself free or breaks the line that
restrains his freedom by leaping from
the water and throwing the weight of
his tail against the delicate but strong-
ly woven cord.

During the summer months deer are
in season. The Belknap and Foley mi-
neral spring waters, and others of some-
what similar nature in this vicinity, at-
tract deer, probably by reason of the salt
that is held in solution. In other days
trails that had all the appearance of
being freshly traveled by bands of
sheep, converged at these springs.
These trails were made by deer. Two
wanton slaughter in those days has
decreased the supply and rendered
them timid, yet of nights, and occa-
sionally in the daytime, they timidly
and cautiously approach and enter
these dangerous limits, the penalty for
which they apparently realize, may be
their great bodily harm. The state-
ment that thousands of deer have been
slain at these springs is not unadvised-
ly made. And it would require not
less than two figures to enumerate the
thousands. Hunters killed for the
hides—a sickening slaughter of the
innocent! This crime (no other word
fits the case) has brought the just
and unvarying compensation that at-
taches to human misdeeds of this kind
—a scarcity, where there should be
profusion. The laws for the protection

of our game game none too soon. To
the credit of the people of these out-
of the way places a reasonable obedience
to the law is required at all hands and
it meets with cheerful compliance.
