Drowned.

Word was received here late last evening announcing the sad news that R. W. Lyman, of this city, was drowned, while working with the Eugene log drive at opposite Natron.

Coroner Griffin and Dr. J. W. Harris immediately started for the scene of the accident, while Marshal Stiles left on his wheel to inform Mrs. Lyman, who was planning with the Baptist Sunday school at Seavy's ferry.

Mr. B. F. Guley, who brought the news and who is working on the drive, states that the accident happened about 4 o'clock while Lyman was attempting to dislodge a log which was entangled in a drift. Tom McMaister, who was with him at the time warned him against the treachery of the place, but Lyman evidently thought lightly of it, for the next instant he plunged in, only to be carried off his feet and into the deeper water below. Those Crail attempted to swim his horses into the current, but, with the cruelty of fate, they were the only horses in the drive that would not go in beyond their depth.

Lyman appeared only once above the water, and when a boat was brought and his body recovered, about 10 minutes later, all signs of life were gone. The body was brought to town about 11:30 last night and taken to the family residence on south Pearl street, where the funeral will take place July 13th at 10 a. m.; interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

William Lyman was born in New York, April 14, 1857, and came to Oregon in 1892. During his residence in this vicinity he was well liked by his associates, as he was an honest hard working man.

Hops — Valentine Loew's Price current of June 30th says: Crop reports from the Pacific coast are conflicting, but there does seem to be a question that less hops will be grown this year. The quantity of unsold stock in Oregon is said to have been reduced to 5000 bales. In New York state the young yards and the older ones that have been well taken care of are looking reasonably well, but many of the old yards, especially those that have been neglected for a year or two past, are not so promising. The dry weather is retarding the growth in some sections. The government report just published shows that the sale of malt liquors during May increased 238,916 barrels over the corresponding month last year.
