CIRCUS DROWNED.

It Intended Visiting Eugene in
a Few Weeks.

BOTTOM OF THE UMPQUA.

Roseburg Review.

"The Australian circus, giving the
greatest and rarest spectacular ex-
hibition of aggregated wonders and
world starting performances, of any
similar concern upon the terrestrial
globe, has come to grief. The small
boy is plunged in sackcloth and ashes,
and the melodious voice of the eloquent
vender of pink lemonade is hushed for
the time being.

"It seems that the circus has been
doing the coast country for several
weeks past, traveling by wagon up
from California. The concern reached
Gardiner in safety and gave its usual
exhibitions there early this week
leaving Wednesday evening on the
steamer Eva for Seattle, expecting
to play intermediate towns enroute to
Roseburg. Not all the outfit could be
loaded on the Eva and it was accord-
ingly placed upon a scow to be towed
up the river by the steamer. On this
scow were four wagons, eight horses,
tent and other paraphernalia and
three employees. All went well until
just above the mouth of Dean Creek
when the scow suddenly went to the
bottom with all its load. The tide
was high and the water was thirteen
feet in the channel when the dis-
aster occurred. Prompt efforts at re-
scue resulted in the men and five horses
getting ashore, while the other horses,
which were tied to the wagons, were
drowned, and the complete outfit lost.
The members of the company were
mostly on the Eva, as were a span of
mules and a part of the circus prop-
erty.

"The circus men say a hole in the
bottom of the scow was the cause of
the disaster, and that the steambot
company is responsible for their loss.
Captain James Graham, of the Eva,
is at a loss to account for it from the
information he has at hand. Capt. N.
J. Cornwall, of the Umpqua River
Navigation Co., met the wrecked
circus at Scottsburg, as he was return-
ing home from San Francisco, and had
the members of the company and their
remaining goods taken back to
Gardiner. No doubt the responsibility
for the accident will be fixed and the
matter of loss satisfactorily adjusted.
"In the meantime the small boy
will wait in vain, and hope, long de-
ferred, will make his heart sick as
he reads, with bulging eyes and bated
breath, the bills of the great consoli-
dated Australian circus, that never
came."

The circus had made arrangements
to visit Eugene during the next four
weeks.

SERIOUS WRECK.

A Number of People Injured—
Four Seriously.

ASHLAND, July 12.—The southbound
passenger train on the Southern Pa-
cific Co's railroad, which left Ashland
at 1:33 o'clock yesterday morning, met
with a serious accident near Gibson,
a station 18 miles south of Dunsmuir,
yesterday at 9 o'clock. The rear Pull-
man car jumped the track and rolled
down an embankment, injuring all of
the passengers in it more or less, while
four of them are reported as being seri-
ously hurt.

The Pullman coach after jumping
the track rolled over and struck against
a huge rock, and continued down the
embankment about 75 feet to the river,
where it now lies a total wreck.
Fortunately there was not a crowd of
passengers in the car at the time, and
while all of them were bruised more or
less, only four sustained serious inju-
ries.

They are Mrs. G. A. Pierce, back badly
hurt.

G. A. Pierce, shoulder badly injured
and collar bone broken.
Miss Merton, hand, wrist and arm
badly cut and lacerated.
John Almon, colored, the porter of
the car, sustained severe injuries to
his chest.

The injured passengers were taken
to Redding by the S. P. Co. and their
injuries given strict attention.
The train was in charge of Conduc-
tor Hood.

The wreck occurred at the same
place where two days previously seven
freight cars jumped the track and were
ditched.

The Game Law.

In response to requests we give a
synopsis of the game laws of Oregon as
it now exist:

Deer, moose and mountain sheep
may be killed from July 15 to Nov. 1.
Prohibited for market entirely. Spot-
ted fawn not to be killed at all. Deer
hunting prohibited between one hour
after sunset and half an hour before
sunrise. No dogs allowed.

Grouse, prairie chickens, pheasants,
Chinese pheasants, quail and partridges
may be killed from Oct. 1 to Dec. 1.
Market hunting prohibited in Chinese
pheasants for three years from spring
of '99, other birds from Nov. 15 to Oct.
15. Trap, netting and snaring of birds
prohibited. Jack snipe may be killed
from Sept. 1 to Feb. 1. Only fifteen
upland birds may be killed in a day.
No shooting from public highways,
nor on farms without permission.

Trout may be caught from April 1
to Nov. 1, but never under five inches
in length, and only with hook and
line. Eastern brook trout introduced
protected for three years from spring
of '99.
