WHERE CORKS GROW.

The cork tree is an evergreen, about the size of our apple tree. The bark is stripped in order to obtain the cork, which is soaked and then dried. The moment the bark is peeled off the tree begins to grow another cork skin, and each new one is better than the last; so the older, the better the cork.

The trees are stripped about every eight years, and so strong does it make them that they often live to the age of 200 years. Besides its chief use as stoppers for bottles, cork is made into buoys, making life preservers to save people from drowning, soles of boots and slippers, fancy rock work, largely for life boats, and sometimes for artificial limbs. After the bark is stripped off it is trimmed and dried and flattened out. Then it is shipped to all parts of the world.

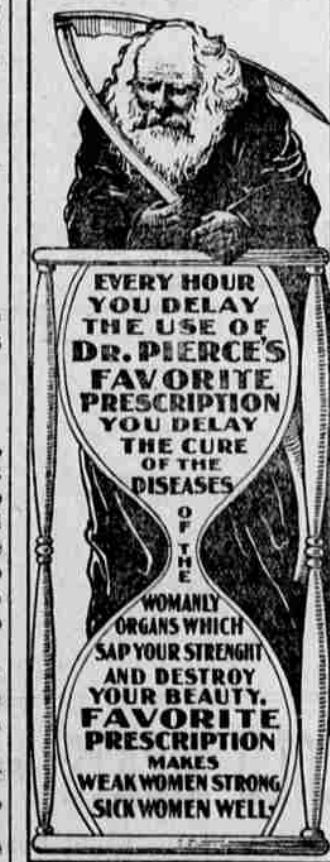
