HOME CURED MEATSGray & Son Are Engaging in
New Business.

REGULAR PACKING HOUSE.

Gray & Son, who recently disposed
 of their grocery business to Sterner &
 Wright, have entered a new business,
 that of cured meats. They have moved
 a large barn on the Isaac Gray, Sr,
 place, Eleventh and Willamette
 streets, out on the street, and will use
 this as their place of business.

John S Gray, the manager, showed
 a GUARD reporter over the building
 this morning. It is well arranged for
 the new industry, and already the
 firm is turning out a good grade of
 cured hams and sides. The smoker is
 large and will accommodate a large
 quantity of meat, three layers or stories
 of meat being placed in at one time.

About 25 hours is the time required to
 cure one filling of the smoker. At the
 present Gray & Son are buying large
 quantities of salted sides and hams
 from a distance, but they state that as
 soon as the farmers of this county
 realize that they can find a home
 market for all the porkers they can
 raise, the firm will begin to use all that
 is offered them.

This is an industry that is in its
 infancy in the West, for annually
 there is imported into Oregon from
 states as far east as Iowa large quan-
 tities of cured meats. Messrs Gray &
 Son are starting in the business right,
 and are carefully handling their
 product. They will sell direct to the
 retailer, and in a short time home-
 cured meats of the best grades can be
 found on sale at all stores. This is a
 move in the right direction, and these
 gentlemen will receive the encourage-
 ment they merit in this enterprise.

Rev. G. A. Blair Retires From
 Cumberland Presbyterian
 Church.

ED. A. WEST.

Committed Suicide at Seattle Sat-
urday.

The following appeared in the As-
 sociated Press dispatches yesterday:
 SEATTLE, July 14.—E A West, for-
 merly of Boise, Idaho, committed sui-
 cide in a hotel in this city at 10 o'clock
 this evening. He came here several
 days ago, and had frequently com-
 plained of ill health to employees of the
 hotel, but gave no hint of intended
 self-destruction. Papers found among
 his effects indicate that he was for-
 merly in business in Boise. He was a
 member of the Elks lodge, of Roseburg,
 Oregon.

The deceased came to Eugene sev-
 eral years ago, worked in the sash and
 door factory for some time, afterward
 tended bar for Wm Renshaw, and was
 owner of the Hoffman House saloon
 for a time. He married a Miss Hempe,
 of this city, but she has been separated
 from him for about four months, and a
 suit for divorce is being instituted by
 her against him at Boise, Idaho. After
 selling the Hoffman House saloon
 Mr West went to Boise, where he
 has been in business until recently.

Nothing is known of the life of Mr
 West previous to his residence in
 Eugene.

CLOSED HIS PASTORATE.

Rev. G. A. Blair Retires From
Cumberland Presbyterian
Church.

Oregonian July 16.

Rev G A Blair, who has been pastor
 of the First Cumberland Presbyterian
 church for over six years, closed his
 connection with that church yester-
 day. He preached morning and
 evening, and took leave of the mem-
 bers regretfully. When he took charge
 there were but few members, and the
 first meeting was held in Hawthorne
 Hall, on the corner of East Morrison
 street and Union avenue, there being
 but few present. He leaves the
 church with a membership of about
 200. A handsome building, costing
 about \$6000, was put up, and with
 the ground on East Twelfth street,
 the property is free from debt. Mr
 Blair tendered his resignation on ac-
 count of the failure of his health. Two
 years ago he was compelled to take a
 long vacation, but this time when he
 felt that he was breaking down, he
 went at once and filed his resignation.
 At first the church asked that he re-
 call it, but Mr Blair feeling that the
 Portland church should have a strong
 man at the helm, insisted that the
 resignation be accepted, and his re-
 quest was complied with reluctantly.
 He will take a long rest at the seaside
 before engaging in work of any sort.
 The incoming pastor, Rev J J Dalton,
 D D, of Henderson, Ky, will arrive in
 Portland about the first of September.

Council Proceedings.

The city council met in adjourned
 session Saturday night. Present, Mayor
 Harris, Councilmen Osburn, Roney
 White, Luckey, Peter. Wm Preston
 took his seat as new member of the
 council.

Amendment to ordinance regulating
 buildings within the fire limits was
 read and laid on the table for further
 consideration.

An ordinance to prevent the leaving
 of saw dust by wood saws on the
 streets was read and adopted.

An ordinance regulating the driving
 of cattle through the streets and alleys
 of the city was read and laid over until
 the next meeting.

An ordinance to construct, improve
 and repair sidewalks and crosswalks
 was read and adopted. Councilman
 White suggested that cross walks in
 the outskirts of the city be reduced
 from 6 to 5 feet wide. Councilman
 Roney made a motion that this be
 done which was carried.

Councilman Osburn made a motion
 that \$1000 of the sewer fund be trans-
 ferred to the general fund and be made
 applicable to the payment of city war-
 rants. Passed.

Councilman Osburn introduced a
 resolution that the marshal be in-
 structed to enforce the ordinance relating
 to cleanliness of alleys and back yards.
 Councilman Peter offered a resolu-
 tion for the flushing of sewers twice a
 month during the dry season by the
 fire warden. Carried.

Communication from Mr Dennis in
 regard to improvement of street car
 line was read and placed on file.
 Bill for \$5 services of marshal was
 ordered paid.

The resignation of J S Stiles as city
 marshal took effect and R O Brady
 was elected to fill the vacancy. El-
 mer Roberts was appointed as night-
 watch. The appointment was referred
 to the committee on police. J S Stiles
 was employed to act as special police-
 man until Monday night.

Council adjourned to meet Monday
 evening.

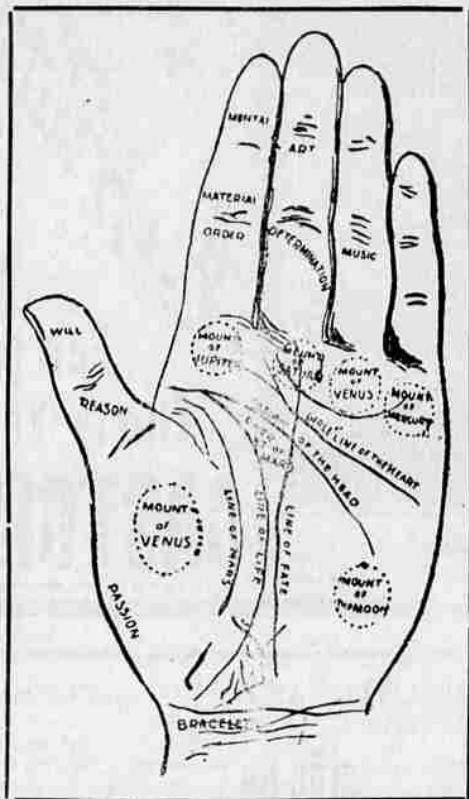
