WILL STRENGTHEN TICKET.

New York World: Adlai Stevenson will strengthen the ticket with straight democrats, silverites, and especially with the opponents of civil-service reform. He has always been "regular." He has had strong silver and paper money views for more than thirty years. When he was assistant postmaster general he made a record as "head man" that has never been equalled. It won him his title of "The Man with the Axe."

Personally he is a good fellow, generally liked, and his private character is irreproachable. No doubt he will be charged, like Bryan, with being an anarchist. But as he has held the vice-presidential office and has discharged its functions creditably, the people will not be afraid of him.

P. L. Fountain, the newly appointed deputy sheriff, was placed in a very embarrassing predicament Tuesday morning by a jail-bird named Herbert Winslow, who is under his custody and keeping, says the Klamath Falls Express. When Mr. Fountain opened the jail about 6 a. m., to give the prisoner a hot cup of coffee, morning hash, etc., young Winslow greeted him with the glad hand and yanked him inside the jail, locked the door and passed on out, leaving the officer to enjoy the bounteous spread all by his lonesome. However, the deputy-sheriff managed to arouse the neighborhood by his plaintive cries for help, and was soon set at liberty. In the meantime the jail-bird had reached Link river, north of town, and started to swim across at the mouth of the lake, and was overtaken by parties in a rowboat and brought back to jail, much refreshed by the morning exercise.

The Salem Journal man writes home from Yaquina: From out over the bar comes the booming of the breaker, where the never ceasing surf is battering away the last vestiges of the millions of dollars of jetties and harbor improvements. Only last winter the tramway on piles that reached from the south beach up to deep water on the bay was driven over to the other shore, and is being sold for stovewood at \$1.50 a cord. It cost the taxpayers a great deal more

than that before it became drift-wood. High tides have carried away some of the bulkheads and large slices of the main business street, but the bay remains and fishing is better than ever before.
